TAFT VOTES SEATING ALL CONTESTANTS

change in the line-up from Wednesday's ballot occurred. As the result was announced, the New York men waving their state banner and standing on chairs. 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Taft men's favor. At 4 6'clock, Committeeman Dorell from the credentials committee reported for the seating of the Taft delegates in the fourth California district and moved its adoption.
