

TALK AND TALK BUT FIND NO SOLUTION

Although the members of the city council spent nearly two hours debating matters in connection with the public market at a special meeting Thursday afternoon they failed to arrive at any agreement in regard to the matter and will meet again in the near future for the purpose of further fighting the matter out. In the meantime a new market ordinance will be drawn by the city attorney.

The bone of contention lies in the matter of selling meat. Butchers who have places of business in the city want to be given a stall at the market to sell meat similar to the one now operated by Bob Crowder. The meat men have found a champion in J. W. Mitchell but the other members of the council believe that they must shut all butchers out and allow only those who produce the meat to sell it at the public market. Another solution is to allow any person to sell meat there provided that the meat is produced in Jackson county. The argument was lengthy but seemingly led to no place at all. The council finally allowed the matter to go over until they had more time.

The Purity Bottling concern which asked for a liquor license for a family trade liquor store was denied a license.

A notice of protest was passed regarding the paving of a street through the city park. As this street was ordered improved some time ago the notice of protest is somewhat of a joke but is ordered so that the council will be able to sell bonds to pay for the pavement. Attention was called to defects in the pavement on a number of streets in the city. The street commissioner stated that he had made a list of such places and that the Clark & Henery construction company had agreed to repair the streets at the earliest possible moment.

ANDERSON TO INVADE FRISCO

If Bud Anderson is successful in winning a decisive victory over Abe Label, who is rated as one of San Francisco's best lightweight boxers, in next Monday night's ten round main event bout at the Medford Athletic club, Anderson will bid goodbye to Oregon for some time to come. He will first invade San Francisco or Los Angeles and later in the fall may tour the east.

Anderson's manager, Dick McDonald, stated yesterday, that they fully realized in agreeing to box Abe Label that they were meeting the hardest man Anderson has ever met, and a boxer who has the reputation of being one of the best lightweights on the Pacific Coast. Donald said, "If we win over Label next Monday night I think we are entitled to go after bigger game, as Label is considered to be right up close to the topnotchers. Anderson would like to be given the chance to meet Willie Ritchie or Joe Rivers as Bud bars no one in the world at 133 pounds."

Such is the intention of Bud Anderson, pride of Medford, if he defeats Abe Label next Monday night, but now comes Mr. Abe Label, who claims he also has some say in next Monday night's affair and thinks that young Anderson and his manager are kind of counting their chicks before they are hatched. Label does not underestimate Anderson, and says he knows that Bud is a good rugged boy and hard to beat, but Abe is confident that Anderson will taste his first defeat next Monday night, and Abe is not all by himself in that opinion either, as there are quite a few Medford men who have seen Label box in San Francisco and they say they are kind of afraid that Anderson has picked a "hard one."

Even some of Anderson's most ardent admirers and close friends are a little doubtful if their favorite can hold his own with the "foxy Abe," who is claimed to be a "ring general," if there ever was one.

The club wishes to state that there will be no hitch in Monday night's show, and the first preliminary will start positively at 8:30 p. m. sharp, followed immediately by the main event of the evening, so that the whole show will be over before 10 o'clock p. m.

HORSES BOLT; THREE ARE HURT

While driving to town from her suburban home east of Bear creek last Sunday evening accompanied by her two young daughters, Mrs. Wm. Puhl of Central Point met with a serious accident as a result of her team bolting, says the Herald. One of the animals was inclined to wildness and about the time they struck the pavement on east Pine street the bit broke and the horse bolted. In front of Mayor Cowley's home the rig collapsed and the occupants were thrown to the ground with serious results. The youngest child of six years sustained two very serious cuts on the thigh the femoral artery being closely grazed. Bonita, the oldest daughter, a girl of nine, was badly bruised and received other injuries. Mrs. Puhl received a bad scalp wound and a number of painful bruises. One of the horses in the team, a quiet one and a family pet, sustained a badly broken leg, a fracture occurring both above and below the knee.
