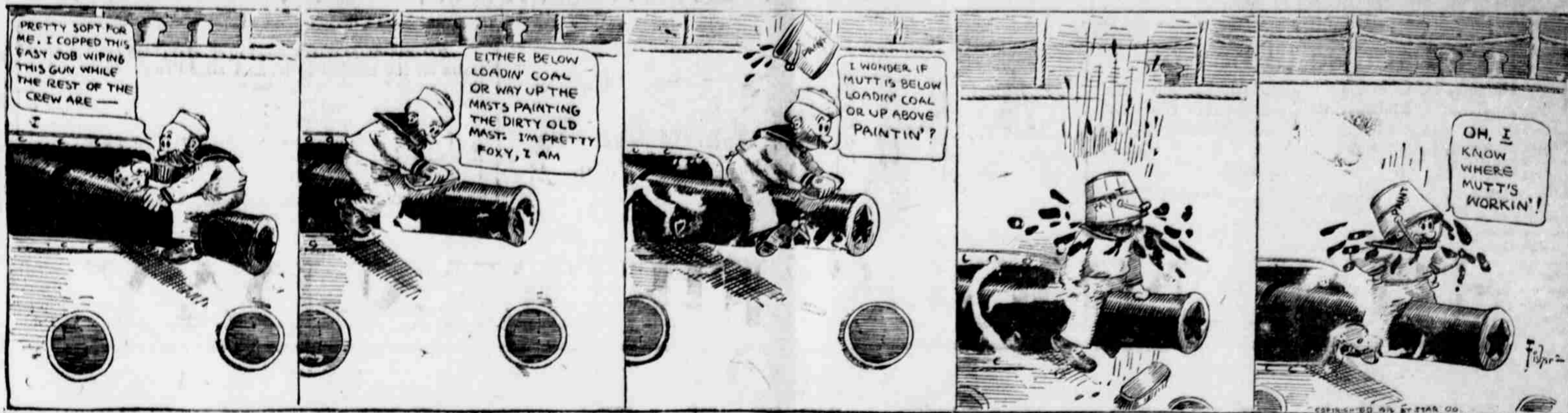

PRINCE PALATINE WINS GOLD CUP AT ASCOT

LONDON, June 21.—Thomas Pilkington's Prince Palatine won the Gold Cup race, the feature of the third day of the Ascot meeting.
Edward Estalery's Bass Point was second and L. Robertson's Bill and Company third, at odds of 2 to 1, 3 to 1, and 11 to 2 respectively on the winners. Frank O'Neil, an American jockey, rode Prince Palatine. The race was worth \$17,500 to the winner and carried also a \$2,500 trophy offered by King George.

MEDFORDITES UPON VARSITY FACULTY

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, EUGENE, Ore., June 21.—In the annual meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Oregon, the board went on record as promising to turn back into the treasury the \$500,000 granted it by the legislature in the last session, providing the court annulled the referendum petitions as fraudulent in case the people of the state voted favorably upon the proposed bill, providing for one Board of Regents and millage support for the University and the Agricultural College. Also, they voted funds for the establishment of a Department of Journalism at the University, and elected Miss Ruth Guppy, of Tacoma, a graduate of the University of Michigan, as Dean of Women. The position of Dean of Women has not been filled since the resignation of Dr. Luella Clay Carson, four years ago, to accept the presidency of Mills College.

One of the most important acts of the Board was to select Dr. George Rebec, formerly of the University of Michigan, as head of the Department of Education at the University. Dr. Rebec resigned his position in the University of Michigan two years ago on account of ill health, and moved to a farm near Medford. R. W. Prescott, of Baker, now secretary to President Campbell, was made an assistant in the department of public speaking, and Mrs. Mabel Holmes Payson, of Medford, was elected an assistant in the Department of Rhetoric, and Dr. William Macky Smith, of LaFayette College, was chosen as assistant professor of mathematics.
