"I hope that it will be understood," said Root, "that the friends of Mr. Taft or any other candidate in this convention will accord the same treatment to a representative of Mr. Roosevelt that they would give their own spokesman."

When Allen concluded Watson moved that the minority report of the rules committee be tabled. This was done by a viva voce vote. Then former Vice-President Fairbanks, chairman of the committee on resolutions was recognized.

When Fairbanks began his report his voice did not carry and there were shouts of "louder."

ACCUSE DARROW OF ENDEAVORING TO HYPNOTIZE WITNESS

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 22.—Confusion reigned in Judge Hutton's court during the trial of Clarence S. Darrow on a jury bribery charge today when District Attorney Fredricks, hair disheveled and quivering with rage, leaped to his feet during a grueling cross examination John H. Harrington by Chief Counsel Earl Rogers and charged Darrow with trying to hypnotize the witness.

"Darrow is trying to get Harrington to look him in the eye," shouted Fredricks. "If he catches that man's eye he will hypnotize him. I know whereof I speak. Darrow used hypnosis on poor George Behm (Orin McManigal's uncle). He is trying to cast a spell over this witness right now. I heard someone whisper to Darrow to catch Harrington's eye. If he does, the witness will fall under his spell."

Yells and whoops of laughter filled the courtroom. Bailiffs vainly pounded for order.

"That's the most childish statement I ever heard in a court room in my life," gasped Darrow when he could speak.

It was no joke to the district attorney. He faced the howling spectators with flushed face and shouted the accusation.

Harrington kept his gaze steadily averted, looking over the jurors' heads with his face turned sharply away from the attorneys' table. As the court bailiffs were having great difficulty in trying to subdue the laughter, court adjourned temporarily.

STEAM ROLLER IS EXCEEDING SPEED LIMIT

ed on the roll by the national committee was confirmed.

Governor Johnson has walked out of the republican convention, as he "does not care to see a continuation of the outrage being perpetrated."

2:45 p. m.—Temporary convention officials made permanent.

2:54 p. m.—Roosevelt demonstration starts.

3:19 p. m.—Roosevelt demonstration has been on 15 minutes.

COLISEUM, CHICAGO, June 22.—It was 10:44 when Chairman Root called the convention to order and introduced as the chaplain of the day Rev. John Wesley Hill of New York. Hill has been very active in campaigning for Taft and the Pennsylvania delegates laughed when he was announced, but all stood reverently during the opening prayer.

When he prayed that the country should be spared from "restlessness and disturbance," however, there was a titter from the New York delegation, and as he concluded someone in the Pennsylvania delegation whistled "Toot, toot" and a laugh went up.

The credentials committee reported immediately in favor of seating the Taft delegates at large from Mississippi. There was a minority report, but the majority declaration was adopted by a viva voce vote.

Steam Roller Rolls Along

There was so much disorder when the votes were taken that Root could not be heard even by the delegates in the front seats. There was hooting, howling, catcalls and jeers. The committee was unanimous in continuing on the temporary roll the delegates seated by the national committee in the fourth Carolina, third Oklahoma and second Tennessee districts and this action was approved by a viva voce vote.

When the majority and minority report in the Texas cases were presented, Delegate Cady of Wisconsin scored the Roosevelt leaders for hav-

ing presented "trumped up" contests in certain districts. He said that in one Indiana district the Roosevelt forces "created a state of anarchy."

"There were enough contests here," said Cady, "that if properly decided would prevent either the Taft or the Roosevelt forces controlling this convention and then the rank and file of the delegates would have a chance!" So far as the Texas delegates at large were concerned, Cady said the Lyon or Roosevelt delegates should have seated.

"The seating of Taft delegates from Texas," he said, "is simply for the purpose of control."

Taft Delegates Seated

The vote on the Texas cases was a viva voce vote, and the Taft men were declared seated by Chairman Root.

With the approval of the Texas contests the work of the credentials committee was completed. It had upheld in every instance the work of the national committee on the temporary roll.

The report of the committee on permanent organization, recommending that the temporary organization be made permanent was then adopted, Root surrendering the gavel to Parliamentarian Olmstead for the purpose of putting the motion. Root was warmly applauded.

The report of the rules committee was then presented. There were minority and majority reports in this instance.

Before the rules were taken up Delegate Henry Allen of Kansas was recognized to present the position of the Roosevelt forces. He said that he had expected to make the statement as soon as the credentials committee had completed its work.

"After I get through we will not try to put any more sand in the gasoline," he said. He then read the statement that had been given out some hours previously by Colonel Roosevelt.

The mention of Roosevelt's name started an excited demonstration in which the Roosevelt delegates and alternates joined and were aided by the crowds in the galleries.
