Value is so inconsistant and the law governing it is so subtle that reason is incupable of distinguishing whether a change in value has taken place in the thing itself or in money. To all appearances the value of money never changes at all, as the dollar always remains a dollar, and wihtout a knowledge of the principles of money a novice must believe that the value of money does not change, but all fluctuations are changes in the value of the commodities themselves.

All eyes were rivited on the Chicago convention, vainly hoping for wise political action that will result in prosperity. The men who represent money power played a "sure thing" game, using the delegates as their puppets. The bosses are not always able to control the puppets. but they are absolute and supreme no matter what action the puppets may take. It is only a matter of expediency whether they coerce a hostile administration or coerce the conventions and put up candidates who will take orders to create and protect special privilege; and as long as gold remains the standard of value the money power is the supreme and only authority that regulates the degree of prosperity or panic by the regulation of the supply and demand
