

## FERVID ORATORY AT CONVENTION

gressive candidates and a progressive platform.

"The people will tear the mask from those who robbed them," shouted Senator Rayner, "and the thief will be revealed, to the benefit of democracy."

### Delegates Have Fun

A storm of applause followed, which was punctuated by a voice from the rear shouting: "Woodrow Wilson can win."

When Rayner had concluded Chairman Parker smilingly announced that the lists were open and suggested that delegates send up the names of favorites whom they wanted to hear speak.

From the Alabama delegation came an instant yell for "Representative Heflin, one of the best firebrand speakers in the house." Heflin who sat on the platform, shook his head, but it took some time for Parker to restore order enough to introduce Representative Clayton of Alabama.

Winding up a flight of oratory he declared:

"I don't know who the candidate of this convention will be."

Clayton was nearly swept off his feet by the immediate response.

"Underwood, Clark, Wilson, Harmon," yelled the crowd in a blend of noise. Parker's efforts to still the cheering went unheeded. The delegates stood on their chair and good humoredly handed yells for their candidates with their rivals across the aisles. When Clayton attempted to resume he was drowned again by the New Jersey delegation singing:

### Noisy Enthusiasm

"Oh, Woodrow Wilson," to the tune of "Mister Dooley."

Then the band started, "Maryland, My Maryland," and that revived the enthusiasm. It became still more noisy as the tune switched to such old favorites as "Swanee River," and "My Old Kentucky Home," winding up with "My Country 'Tis of Thee," in which everybody joined.

The noise grew to a tremendous shout when the band started anew with "Dixie." Clayton finally succeeded in restoring a semblance of quiet. Then, a second later, he started off another incipient burst by declaring that the present convention would nominate the next president.

Thomas P. Riley, state chairman of Massachusetts, was the next speaker. He declared that the fight now "was between the dollar on the one side and the enfranchised voters on the other."

Senator Gore, of Oklahoma, the blind statesman, followed Riley.

### Blind Statesman Talks

"Let us have peace," he counselled, "peace at any sacrifice, save of honor. Let us put every democrat under bond to keep the peace. Let us levy a prohibitive tariff on the apples of discord. Nothing can prevent a victory for democracy unless it be division."

Gore was applauded vigorously as he referred to Roosevelt having unsuccessfully tried to "breathe life into the petrified republican party."

Gore said that Monticello, home of Jefferson, should be purchased by the government and he paid a glowing tribute in this connection to Mrs. Littleton, wife of the New York congressman for her efforts to secure this legislation.

"Let us have more trade, less graft and no more Taft," he declared.

John Temple Graves also spoke for harmony, declaring that the last breach in the democratic ranks had been healed and predicting a triumphal victory in November. He dubbed Roosevelt "a political John the Baptist, crying aloud in the wilderness of the convention, 'prepare ye, make way for democracy.'"

### Roosevelt is Grilled

Mayor Preston of Baltimore welcomed the delegates to the city.

Ex-Governor Campbell declared that both branches of the republican party are dead.

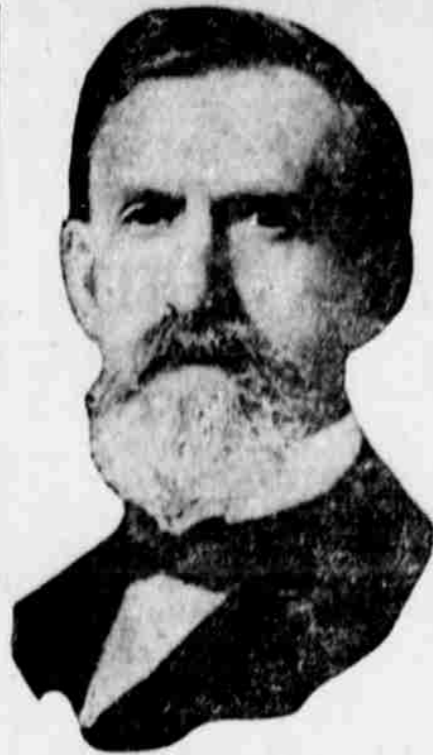
"One led by Taft," he said, "is composed of camp followers and the like. The other is led by a self-sufficient egotist, the only man who ever had the gall to go to Gettysburg to speak on the spot where Lincoln delivered that immortal address."

When Campbell concluded, Representative Robinson of Arkansas, attempted to secure an adjournment until 2 o'clock tomorrow but was unable to go behind a previous order adopted by the convention that it meet tonight at 8 o'clock.

At 2.18 Representative Palmer, of Pennsylvania moved an adjournment to that hour. It carried.

## NEWLANDS WOULD DISFRANCHISE NEGROES

BALTIMORE, June 26.—Senator Newlands of Nevada presented an entire platform he had drawn. It declared that "the republican party has drifted from the teachings of Lincoln and now is the party of privilege."

It favored gradual reduction of tariff duties and supplementary legislation, strengthening the Sherman anti-trust law. The Aldrich currency plan was denounced in the Newlands platform, and a new plan of reserve associations, made up of both national and state banks, was suggested. Newlands went into the race question, asking a declaration that would say:

"Experience has demonstrated that the granting of the franchise to the blacks under the belief that it was necessary for their protection was a mistake and that it has led and can lead to nothing but their injury."

"Entertaining nothing but the most humane and helpful purposes regarding the blacks in our midst and the most friendly disposition to races differing in color and confronting us on the Pacific coast, we declare our purpose to maintain this as a white man's country and to that end we favor a constitutional amendment confining the privilege of voting, to the white race and legislation prohibiting the immigration to this country of all peoples other than those of the white race, except for such temporary purposes of education, travel or commerce as comity between friendly nations may require."

## WOMEN'S CLUBS IN ANNUAL SESSION

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 26.—Reports of committees and officers, including that of the president, Mrs. Phillip North Moore, occupied the first day's active business sessions of the eleventh biennial convention of the general federation of women's clubs here to day. In the afternoon conferences of the various state presidents and general federation secretaries, with Mrs. Moore presiding, and of the chairmen of departments, Mrs. Emmons Crocker presiding, were important features.

The convention was formally opened last evening in the big pavilion where the two weeks business sessions will be held. Mrs. Moore called the convention to order, and the delegates were welcomed with addresses by Mayor James Rolph, junior, and Albert J. Wallace, lieutenant governor of California. Nearly 5,000 were present.

The keen interest in the coming questions before the convention is being shown by a series of caucuses which are being held at the headquarters of the various federation leaders, who are mapping out a careful program for Monday next, when the real convention battle will begin.

Receptions were held yesterday at the Palace Hotel, the chief stronghold of the federation leaders, where the president, Mrs. Moore, Mrs. Percy V. Pennybacker, Texas candidate to succeed Mrs. Moore, and Mrs. Phillip N. Carpenter, New York candidate, have their headquarters.

The Texas delegates, headed by Mrs. W. W. Bains, of Houston, Texas, are lining up their forces to bring the suffrage question before the convention and put the federation on record in regard to votes for women.
