The first game will be with Grants Pass, starting at 2:30 p. m. McFarlan will be on the slab for the visitors while Ike Butler will act in a like capacity for the locals. Talent and Medford will start playing immediately after the first game is finished.

The usual admission will cover both games.

SUFFRAGETTE FORCES ROYALTY TO LISTEN

CARDIFF, Wales, June 26.—A suffragette forced King George and Queen Mary to hear her appeal here today, but was arrested for her pains. The king and queen were visiting the cathedral when the suffragette suddenly rushed into the royal presence, demanding "votes for women" and loudly denouncing Home Secretary McKenna for the attempts to forcibly feed Mrs. Pankhurst and Mrs. Lawrence when they declared a hunger strike in Holloway prison. She charged the officials with attempting to murder the suffrage leaders. The guards quickly rushed to the protection of the king and queen. The suffragette was dragged out of the cathedral and thrown into jail.

St. Paul Wants T. R. Convention
ST. PAUL, Minn., June 26.—St. Paul wants the convention of the new Roosevelt party. The public affairs committee of the city council today invited the new party to hold the convention in this city. A campaign will be pushed toward securing the meeting.

PAYS \$10 FOR FAST DRIVING

The motorcycle riders who are planning to enter the motorcycle races on July 4 in this city are daily working out on the Ross Lane road and considerable complaint is being made by the ranchers and others who use the road. The macadam roadway is in excellent shape for speed and the boys were not slow in finding it out.

W. Tyler Smith one of the pioneer motorcycleists of this city after trying out the country road Tuesday afternoon started into the city at great speed and failed to slow up on West Main after he struck the pavement. Chief Hittson was in waiting and Smith paid a fine of \$10. It is said that he was traveling 60 miles an hour.

Chief Hittson is again on the war-path for speeders and if some of the automobile drivers are not more careful on the resident streets of the city they are likely to find themselves in the mayor's court.

NEW SOLICITOR NAMED BY TAFT

WASHINGTON, June 26.—President Taft today accepted the resignation of Frederick W. Lehmann, solicitor general of the United States. Lehmann is a democrat but he said today that politics had nothing to do with his resignation. His relations with the president and attorney general were pleasant, he added, but he desired to return to private practice in St. Louis, his home city.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., June 26.—Friends of Marshall Bullitt, a young attorney here, say he has accepted appointment by President Taft as solicitor general of the United States to succeed Frederick W. Lehmann of St. Louis.
