

## ROAD BILL WILL GET ON BALLOT

Confident that the Medford Home Rule road bill will get on the ballot and that it will sweep the state. In November Judge W. M. Colvig who has been touring the state in its interests returned to Medford this morning with his hard efforts to secure the necessary signatures on the petitions which will insure the appearance of the measure on the ballot but prepared to work still harder in its behalf.

"I believe that we will succeed in getting the measure on the ballot," states Judge Colvig. "Nothing has been left undone to insure this. I am equally confident that the measure will sweep the state for it met with hearty approval in every section where I explained it."

## FINAL DEFEAT OF REBELS NEAR

CHIHUAHUA, Mex., June 27.—With federal General Huerta sending his full force of 5,000 troops against the rebel stronghold at Hachimba, forty-six miles from here, and confidently asserting that he will be in Chihuahua within five days, the crisis in the Mexican revolution is believed to be at hand today. The rebels, well entrenched and strongly fortified, are awaiting the attack with a force equal to that of the federal.

General Huerta has moved his artillery up to within seven miles of the rebels. With this he will attack of Governor Hadley of Missisippi sent out two flanking columns to attack them from either side.

Consternation reigns here among foreign residents, many of whom have raised the flags of their own nations over their dwellings.

## SPRECKLES OFFERS BRYAN SUPPORT

This telegram was sent today to William J. Bryan by the millionaire San Francisco republican, who recently backed Senator LaFollett's campaign for the presidential nomination. He promised, in his communication to Bryan, to spare no effort to compass the Nebraska's election, if nominated, as the president of all the people.

## CONTRACT LET FOR NEW STABLE

Walker proprietor of the Nash livery stables. The building will be two stories in height and will 75 by 100 feet in size. It is being erected by L. Neldermeyer. Over 200,000 "Made in Medford" brick will be used in the building.

Mr. Neldermeyer recently purchased the site from Frank Watten paying \$10,000. The new barn is to be one of the most modern and convenient in Southern Oregon. It will be fireproof throughout.

## NEW RANGER CABINS AND BARNS ORDERED

Contracts have been let by M. L. Erickson supervisor of the Crater National forest for the erection of a new ranger cabin at Joe Bar, a barn at the same place, a barn at the Star ranger station on the Applegate, a tool cabin on Sturgis creek near the head of Steamboat. The party consisted of Professor H. F. Wilson of the department of entomology of the Agricultural college; Professor H. S. Jackson, plant expert of the college; A. H. Carson of Grants Pass, horticulturist of the third district, and Professor F. C. Reimer of Medford, superintendent of the southern Oregon experiment station.

The experts are urging that the Coos county people make a specialty of two fruits, the loganberry and the Gravenstein apple.

## HANFORD TRIAL OPENS AT SEATTLE

SEATTLE, June 26.—In the room where Judge Cornelius H. Hanford of the western district of Washington presided for years as circuit judge, he was this morning himself placed on trial by the congressional investigation into the impeachment charges preferred against him.

Leonard Olsson, whom Judge Hanford disfranchised because he admitted political leanings toward socialism, was the first witness called by the special investigating committee consisting of Representative J. M. Graham of Illinois, chairman, and Representative E. W. Higgins of Connecticut and W. J. McCoy of New Jersey. The committee arrived Tuesday night and at once prepared for its work. A number of witnesses were subpoenaed yesterday. Judge Hanford has summoned in his defense an array of the best legal talent in the city.
