

NEW PARTY MAY PUT COMPLETE COUNTY TICKET IN FIELD

In all probability the National Progressive party launched by Colonel Theodore Roosevelt following the Chicago convention will place a complete county ticket in the field for the election in November in this county. The state leaders of the new party are already figuring on a state ticket and as Jackson county has a large number of progressives within its confines it is believed that they will take steps to put a county ticket out. The matter is now being discussed.

If the progressives do name a ticket it will mean five tickets in the field. The regular republicans, the democrats, the prohibitionists and the socialists already have named their tickets and the progressive party would make five.

Two members of the republican county central committee—A. K. Ware and F. W. Mears—have already resigned as they do not feel that they can continue to work for Mr. Taft as they state they are of the belief that he stole the nomination through fraud.

THIRD PARTY FOR PORTLAND

PORTLAND, June 27.—The new progressive third party was formally launched in Oregon today when Dan Kellaher, one of the Roosevelt state leaders, issued a call for a mass meeting next Monday evening to form a Roosevelt organization to be known as the "Roosevelt Progressive Bandana club." In his call for the meeting Kellaher states the organization will be formed along strictly non-partisan lines. Former United States Senator Mulkey and other well known leaders will address the meeting.

TRYING TO SETTLE STRIKE ON SOUTHERN PACIFIC LINES

SACRAMENTO, Cal., June 27.—Information received by Harriman shop strikers officials here, from trustworthy sources in San Francisco, is to the effect that the secret conference of Harriman line chiefs in the office of President Sproule of the Southern Pacific in San Francisco during the past week, has been working out the details of a plan of settlement of the great strike on the Harriman and Illinois Central systems.

BIG FIGHT TO START AT 2 P. M.

LAS VEGAS, N. M., June 27.—That the Johnson-Flynn fight will start promptly at 2 p. m. (mountain time) was the positive announcement made today by Promoter Jack Curley. Efforts of newspaper men to induce Curley to hold the battle in the morning failed because Curley was unable to get the railroads to bring the expected crowds into the city in time. For the first time in ten days the weather was very hot but both fighters were out early, each doing about eight miles.

As the day of the fight approaches, Flynn is growing more confident. He is undoubtedly gaining followers too, although the betting still favors Johnson, at 5 to 2, with little money coming in.

While orders for seats have not come in as readily as the promoters had hoped, Curley insists that there will not be fewer than 10,000 in the arena when the bout starts.

MAYOR OF PORTLAND UNDER INDICTMENT

PORTLAND, Ore., June 27.—Mayor Rushlight, Chief of Police Slover and Captain of Detectives Baty were indicted today by the county grand jury in connection with the charges made by Deputy District Attorney Collier that city detectives acting under orders had attempted to bribe him. The exact charge is not known.

Clifford Maddux and Frank Reed, former police officers, also were indicted. All the defendants are charged with attempting to bribe Deputy District Attorney Collier.

It is charged \$400 was offered Collier to obtain the dismissal of a true bill charging Reed and Maddux with extortion. It is asserted the alleged offering of money to Collier was part of a plot to "get the goods on Collier" as a grafter and arrest him. Chief of Police Slover and Mayor Rushlight admitted knowledge of the plot say it was legitimate to use such methods as they believed Collier dishonest and thought they could thus expose him.

TEAM IS KILLED BY LIGHTNING ON ROGUE RIVER ROAD

A team owned by Charles Veghtes of Eagle Point and driven by A. P. Zimmerman was struck by lightning on the Rogue river road six miles above Eagle Point, Wednesday and instantly killed. Zimmerman was badly jarred by the force of the shock but escaped serious injury.

According to Zimmerman the shock came absolutely without warning. He was blinded by a flash of lightning and partially stunned. When he recovered both horses were dead having dropped in their tracks. They were unmarked except for burns about the head.
