CAMPAIGN WAGED FOR SUNDAY SCHOOLS

Word of the selection of the men who occupy the important positions of the advisory board of the American Sunday School Union in the Pacific northwest comes with a deal of satisfaction to the friends of the work of this great society.

This society is the oldest Sunday school missionary society and the only inter-denominational Sunday school missionary society in America, and, from the standpoint of regularly employed workers, the largest in the world.

For many years a limited number of missionaries have been employed in the Pacific northwest but a survey of conditions showing an alarmingly large number of untaught people and an increasing number of un-reached communities brought forcibly to the board of managers of the society a need for an enlarged force of union missionaries in this section.

Immediately the states of Oregon, Washington and Idaho were set apart as the Upper Coast District with E. R. Martin, for a number of years superintendent of the Dakotas, as superintendent with headquarters at Portland, Oregon. Mr. Martin discovered many counties of each of these states with from one-half to three-fourths of the rural school districts without services and from 50 per cent to 75 per cent of the children of school age not in any Sunday school while scores of communities once having services were, through the shifting population, etc., wholly abandoned.

The large success of this work is due in large measure to the inter-denominational character of its work, all homes being gladly open to its missionaries and every denomination supporting loyally its schools and services, but much of its marvelous results for the time and money invested is due to the expert business judgment of its board of managers and advisory boards.
