EARL KENNEDY SHOOTS HIMSELF

Earl Kennedy, aged 17, the son of W. M. Kennedy of this city shot and instantly killed himself at his home on Jackson street Friday afternoon about 4 o'clock. Death was instantaneous the discharge carrying away the entire top of his head.

Two theories are advanced—one that the young man killed himself in a sudden fit of despondency and the other is that he was handling the gun and accidentally was shot. The latter theory is accepted by his family as the young man was not given to despondency and had no reason for the act. While he had been slightly ill with a stomach trouble during the past two weeks it is not believed possible that this could have led him to have taken his life. He was not known to have any troubles.

He spent the day at home and during the afternoon had been gay, in all of his actions. Friends were at the house and he had been chatting with them and making arrangements for a picnic. He left to go to his room on the second floor where he was found a few moments later where he had fallen directly after the gun had been discharged.

Mrs. Kennedy, his mother, is reported to be in a very serious condition today as a result of the tragedy. She is not a strong woman and the shock was very severe.

The inquest was set for 10 o'clock this morning but was postponed until 2 o'clock this afternoon. It will be held at the undertaking parlors of Weeks & McGowan. The jurors are: G. H. Miller, O. M. Soelaby, R. A. Skinner, H. B. Cady, J. F. Hittson and G. C. Garret.
