

RACING CAR LEAVES TRACK; ONE HURT

With J. W. Keyes at the wheel and Frank Cain acting as mechanic the Chalmers 30 which will be seen in the automobile races at the track July 4 took the ditch at 35 miles Friday afternoon during a tryout and as a result Keyes is nursing several bruises while Frank Cain is suffering from a broken rib and possible internal injuries, although no symptoms of anything serious have appeared as yet. The car is in the shop being overhauled and will be again ready for trials by Sunday morning.

Keyes and Cain were trying out the car when the accident occurred. They ran into a rough place near the outer edge of the racetrack and the resulting jolt shot Keyes from his seat. By the time he had regained it the car was off the track and running wild. He killed his engine and set all brakes but the car by that time had piled up. Both men were hurled clear of the wreck.

Other cars on the track rushed to their aid and Cain was rushed to the hospital. He did not lose consciousness at any time. Keyes was only bruised slightly.

The car was towed to the shop and is now being put in condition for the race. It was not badly injured.

REORGANIZE THE E. M. F. SALES FORCE

When the industrial history of the twentieth century is finally written, its most thrilling chapters will almost surely be those that tell the story of the motor car—its sudden dash of popularity, its marvelous manufacturing successes, and its costly tactical failures. So many men learned in the lore of the business world. Certain it is, at any rate, that no department of the world's manufacturing history has yet furnished so great an amount of industrial romance.

News of the greatest feat of this kind comes, as one has learned to expect, from Detroit. In one week, a firm manufacturing annually an output marketed at \$59,000,000, completely reorganized the executive personnel of its system of distribution and then, with the new organization in charge, scored a sales success during the first of the month that eclipsed all its former records for a similar period.

The firm is the Studebaker Corporation whose mammoth automobile division, manufacturing E-M-F "30" and Flanders "20" cars, maintains a round dozen plants. The Studebaker market their product through a system of forty branch warehouses and service stations in the main trading centers. Each of these supplies cars direct to that part of the 2,200 Studebaker dealers in its territory. The branch managers make all contracts and, to practical ends, each is the Studebaker Corporation in his own region.

When Germany decided to go to war with France, General Von Moltke took from a certain pigeon-hole in his desk a complete plan of campaign, drawn up months before. When his emergency came, General Manager Gunn of the Studebaker Corporation did virtually the same thing.

All these men are now firmly established in their new positions, the change having been effected without, so far as is known, interfering with the sale of a single car or the disaffection of a single dealer.

PARKHURST OFF FOR CRATER LAKE

Alfred L. Parkhurst, general manager of the Crater Lake company, and F. W. Hayward, manager of Hotels and Camps, reached Medford Friday afternoon by auto and left Saturday at seven o'clock for camp Arant. They expect to have camp Arant open for the season July 1 and Crater Lake Lodge camp a day or two later. The snow has melted very rapidly during the last few days and they anticipate no difficulty in reaching camp Arant by night. The Crater Lake company's concession in the park has just been extended to cover a period of twenty years more. They will complete Crater Lake Lodge this season and are now having plans prepared for a \$100,000 hotel to be built on the east side of the lake, which will be only twelve miles from the railroad. While this will be the main hotel for rail tourists, Crater Lake Lodge when completed will be the main attraction for those who visit the park in automobiles. The automobile stage line to the lake will make two round trips a week during the season, leaving the Hotel Medford on Tuesdays and Saturdays, returning on Mondays and Thursdays. This will enable those who desire to spend the week end at Crater Lake.
