

# RACE PROGRAM FOR JULY 4 MEET IS ARRANGED

The program for the monster race meeting to be held in this city July 4-5-6 under the auspices of the Medford Driving club on the Rogue River Valley Fair association track and motor speedway is as follows:

**Thursday, July 4th, 4 p. m.**  
Horse Racing Division—First race, 2:30, trot or pace, for Jackson county horses; purse \$100.  
Second race, buggy race; purse \$50.

Third race, running race, free-for-all; purse \$75.

Fourth race, pony race; purse \$25. Entries to be ruled upon by judges.  
Automobile Division—For cars 40 h. p. and under, A. L. M. rating, Distance 45 miles; purse \$100; 1st, \$300; 2nd \$75; 3rd, \$25.

Entries limited to Jackson, Josephine, Klamath and Siskiyou counties.

Motorcycle Division—Free-for-all race, 25 miles; purse \$50. First prize \$35; second prize \$15. Standing start, motor in operation. An entry fee of \$5 showing good faith. Name to be returned to all entries starting. Entries close July 3rd.

**July 5th, commencing at 2:30**  
Horse Racing Division—First race, free-of-all trot or pace for Jackson county horses; purse \$100.  
Second race, \$2:40 trot or pace; purse \$75.

Third race, wild horse race, for Jackson county horses; purse \$75.  
Fourth race, 4 1-2 furlongs, free-for-all; purse \$50.

Automobile race for cars of 30 h.p. and under, A. L. M. rating; 30 miles; purse \$200. First, \$125; second, \$50; third, \$25.

**July 6th, commencing at 2:30**  
Horse Races—First race, free-for-all trot or pace; purse \$125.  
Second Race, one-fourth mile dash, for Jackson county horses; purse \$50.  
Third race, one-half mile dash, free-for-all; purse \$75.

Fourth race, one-half mile running race for lady riders; money divided 75 per cent and 25 percent; purse \$30.  
Motorcycle Race—25 miles free-for-all; purse \$15.

Automobile Race—Free-for-all, 60 miles; purse \$500. First, \$300; second, \$125; third, \$75.  
Conditions governing running races:

All running races 4 to enter, 3 to start.

Entrance fee same as harness races.

Money to be divided 60, 30, 10 per cent.

All running races to be governed by new California Jockey club association rules as far as practicable.

Conditions governing harness races. All harness races to be governed as far as practicable by the National Trotting association rules.

Entries 5 per cent of purses and will be refunded after starting. Entries must be filed with the secretary the night before the race.

Money to be divided 60, 30, 10 per cent.

# MEDFORD LOSES TO GRANTS PASS

Medford suffered the first defeat of the season Sunday when Grants Pass won a fast and close game by the narrow margin of 5 to 4. The game was won and safely pocketed by Medford when two throws gave the game away. A long fly to the left garden was sent home by Antle, Butler, pitcher, took the throw but failed to tag the runner. Not noticing a man on third Butler heaved to second to catch a runner and before the ball got back the winning run had come across.

While Medford hit freely the Grants Pass boys, notably Weckler and Baker connected with Ike and the game belong to any body. It was well worth seeing. The Medford boys played a star fielding game with the one exception. Four double plays were made, two by Miles, second to first, one by Doc Horton second to first and the fourth by Pug Issacs center garden to home plate. Grants Pass pulled a double when the bases were full and the ball driven to the infield.

The game was one of the best of the season and was played before a large crowd.

Medford won a tall end game from Talent by a score of nine to two. Whoever was guilty of matching the two teams deserves a bawling out, but Manager Fuson says it was Court Hall and Shorty Miles and they say it was Fuson. The insult is too deadly to take chances with. The Talent boys were so clearly outclassed that the crowd had left by the end of the third.

# BARTLETTS SHIPPED FROM CALIFORNIA

The California Fruit Distributors issue the following market letter under date of Sacramento, June 29:

The following gives number of cars of deciduous fruit shipped from all points in California for the week ending Friday evening, June 28th, 1912.

Cherries—38 3-4 cars. Nine-tenths of all the cherries moving out of the state during the last week came from the Santa Clara valley. A few are still going forward from Placer county points, consisting almost entirely of Black Oregon. They will last a few days longer, after which time the entire movement will be from the Santa Clara valley. Ten days will probably exhaust the crop so far as eastern shipment is concerned.

Apricots—61 1-2 cars. It will be seen that shipment of this variety has fallen off about ten cars during the past week. The decline will be very much greater during the week to come. Future shipment of this fruit will undoubtedly be light, but there are still some very desirable lots which will be available for the trade.

Plums—65 cars. Shipments of this variety represent a gain of nearly 100 per cent as compared with last week. Climax, Tragedy, Burbank, Red June, Abundance, Simon, Santa Rosa and Formosa are going forward in liberal quantities. Shipments will continue to increase for the next two weeks. Quality of fruit has improved materially.

Peaches—38 1-4 cars. Alexanders are now nearly done, most of the fruit now offering being the Triumph, which are of fair size, fine color and good quality. Hales and St. Johns will soon appear.

Pears—3 1-2 cars. Comet and Lawson still constitute the shipments to date. It is expected a few Bartletts will appear next week. Fruit continues to size up well and the river crop especially promises to be of fine quality.

# ACCIDENT CAUSE OF KENNEDY DEATH, VERDICT

That Earl Kennedy came to his death as the result of an accidental discharge of a twelve-gauge single-barrel shotgun was the verdict handed down by the coroner's jury that convened at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

No motives for suicide were shown. The unfortunate young man was of a cheerful disposition and never addicted to moody moods. At no time in the presence of his family or friends had he mentioned taking his life or acted in any manner that would lead them to believe that his mind was unbalanced.

The coroner's jury found that his death was instantaneous, being caused by a gunshot wound that entered over the right ear and tore away the entire top of the head.

The funeral services were held Sunday afternoon from the Weeks & McGowan chapel, the Rev. W. T. Goulder officiating.
