O'GARA FILES HIS REPORT COVERING WORK FOR YEAR

Professor P. J. O'Gara, pathologist and entomologist for Jackson county has prepared his annual report which he will submit to the county court at its session Wednesday. The report in part follows:

During the fiscal year the total number of trees, plants, vines, etc., inspected totaled approximately 750,000, these having been received by freight and express. During the past year, all nursery stock received was much cleaner, showing the beneficial effect of local inspection in forcing outside nurserymen to be more particular.

Pear Blight One of the most notable results of the past year's work in orchard inspection has been the control of the much dreaded pear blight. Although the past season has been most favorable to the spread of the disease, it has been only in a few cases that the disease has been noticeable, but at all times it has been under perfect control.

Frost Prevention Work One of the most important lines of investigating was the thorough testing of fuel oils and appliances used in orchard heating. Up to the time this work was done, there was on practical information along the lines of fuel and appliance tests which were of any value to the orchardist requiring frost protection.

Weather Bureau Office Beginning with July 1st, 1911, the co-operative Weather Bureau office became a Special Meteorological Station, and was established for the purpose of gathering meteorological data with particular reference to the study of frost conditions.

NOTED WOMAN AVIATOR.

NOTED AVIATRIX DROPS TO DEATH

BOSTON, Mass., July 2.—Miss Harriet Quimby of New York, the first woman to win an aviator's license and the first woman to cross the English channel in an aeroplane, was instantly killed last evening with her passenger, W. A. Willard, manager of the Boston aviation meet at Atlantic City, when her Bleriot monoplane fell into Dorchester bay from a height of 1000 feet.

With the wind gusty and blowing about eight miles an hour, Miss Quimby started to volplane. The angle was too sharp and one of the gusts caught the tail of the monoplane, throwing the machine up perpendicular. For an instant it poised there, then Willard pitched clear of the chassis, followed almost immediately by Miss Quimby. Hurling over and over, the two figures dropped downward, striking the water twenty feet from shore.

BOSTON, July 2.—The aged mother of Miss Harriet Quimby, whose life was crushed out in a 1,000 foot drop into Dorchester Bay from her monoplane late yesterday arrived in Boston today and took charge of the remains. Funeral arrangements will be made later.

The funeral of William A. H. Willard, manager of the Squantum aviation meet being held at Atlantic, who was Miss Quimby's passenger in her fatal flight to Boston Light, will be held tomorrow.
