One of the most notable result of the past year's work in orchar inspection has been the control the much dreaded pear blight. A though the past season has bee most favorable to the spread of th disease, it has been only in a fe cases that the disease has been noticeable, but at all times it ha been under perfect control. The are many orchards in the valley which not a single case of new infection has been found. In various fruit sections of the United States and Canada, pear blight has been so serious this year as to destroy the entire crop, and in some cases wiped out the orchards. Willard, manager of the Boston aviation meet at Atlantic City, when her Bleriot monopiane fell into Dorchester bay from a height of 1909 feet. The couple .386 was on a return trip after circling Boston harbor.

With the wind gusty and blowing about eight miles an hour, Miss Quimby started to volplane. The Medford Pharmacy and other drugangle was too sharp and one of the gusts caught the tail of the monoplane, throwing the machine up perpendicular. For an instant it poised there, then Willard pitched clear of the chassis, followed almost immediately by Miss Quimby. Hurtling over and over, the two figures dropped downward, striking the water twenty feet from shore. It was low tide and the water only five feet deep. Both hodies were badly crushed. 


