CLAIMS SELLING PERJURED HIMSELF

SALEM, Or., July 6.—Charges that Ben Selling violated the corrupt practices act in the recent primary campaign have been received by the secretary of the state. They are made up by Arnold Keller, whose office is given at 14-15 Healy building, Portland. He alleges that Selling, who received the Republican nomination for United States senator, expended \$10,000 during January and February in the interests of his candidacy, which he never reported.

According to statements filed immediately after the primary, Mr. Selling spent personally \$748.16 and there was contributed and spent by friends, for which Max Michel made affidavit, the sum of \$9,944.70. The law allows a candidate for United States senator to expend in his own behalf \$1125.

Duty of Secretary of State While July 3 is the last date on which charges could be filed, the postmark on the envelope shows that the letter was posted at Portland July 2. The secretary of state will immediately notify Mr. Selling of the charges, and, if satisfactory proof is not given to show there was no violation of the corrupt practices act, it will be his duty then to report the entire matter to the district attorney, who is charged with the duty of bringing civil or criminal action. Keller's charges are as follows:

"I hereby complain and aver that the statement of campaign expenses heretofore filed in your office by Ben Selling in his campaign for the office of United States senator does not conform to the law or to the truth. I allege the facts to be that the said Ben Selling spent large sums of money, to wit:

"And also further that larger sums were spent on newspaper advertising during the same period, and other sums for personal canvassing in the interest of the said Ben Selling, and against said Jonathan Bourne, Jr., which sums were not accounted for in said statements filed in your office."

20,000 WATCHING SPEED KING'S RACE

TACOMA, Wa., July 6.—With the huge grand stand capable of holding 16,000 filled to overflowing, four thousand automobiles parked along the stretch and dotted about inside of the track, the great free for all auto race, the Montanara began at 2 o'clock this afternoon. The scheduled starting time was 1:30 but the start was delayed to give Ralph Mulford time to bandage his head so that he could enter in his Knox. He was struck in the head by a flying stone yesterday. When he came down the stretch to the starting line he was cheered by the thousands in the grandstand. At 1:45 when the racers lined up Cooper in the Stutz had the pole, with Hughes in his Mercer next, De Vore in the National followed and Bergdoll in his Benz next. Hughes led in a Mercer, at 2 p. m. sharp, Cooper in Stutz followed, De Vore in National third. Bergdoll in Benz next, Totzlaff in the big Fiat got away next. Blizzard driving a Cole got away next. Hughes' time for the first lap was 4 minutes 9 seconds. He set the pace at an average speed of 74.7 miles. On his second lap De Vore in the National went to the pit with engine trouble. Mulford in the Knox made the second lap in 4 minutes 5 seconds. At 2:15 Hughes went to the pit, on his third lap, out of the race with clutch trouble.
