

PORTLAND READY TO GREET ELKS

PORTLAND, July 6.—With the arrival here of John P. Sullivan, grand exalted ruler, Portland today is the center of interest for the 385,000 Elks of the nation. Sullivan, with his party of grand lodge officials arrived here in a special train and at once the preliminary work for the 48th annual grand lodge reunion of the Elks to be held here beginning Monday and extending throughout the week was under way.

Hundreds of Elks from all parts of the country arrived here today. Sixty members of the Los Angeles lodge are scheduled to arrive here late this afternoon on the steamer Bear.

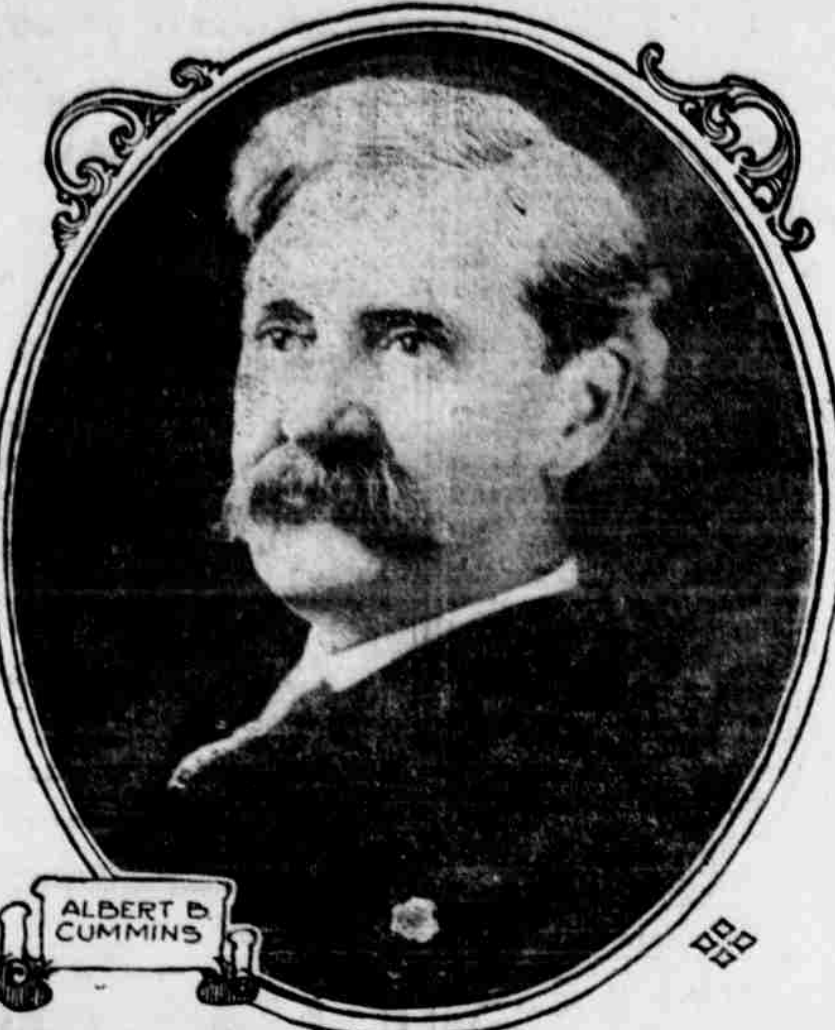

SEN. CUMMINS REFUSES TO FOLLOW TEDDY



WASHINGTON, July 6.—Senator Cummins, the progressive republican candidate in the presidential nomination race, formally declared today against the new party movement led by Theodore Roosevelt and announced his allegiance to the old party. It being so, Cummins said, that bossism could not be escaped by the organization of new parties. Continuing he declared that to those republicans who included Roosevelt, Taft's renomination was the result of fraudulent votes, "the nominee of the convention is not the nominee of the party."

Nevertheless he said he believed the republican party offered more hope for substantial progress toward good government than any other political organization, and he declared it his opinion that disappointment of individual or dishonesty cannot be the foundation for a new party.

John C. Capers, who supported Roosevelt in the convention, also formally announced his intention of support for Taft. He declared the majority of the national committee ruling was "not as severe as the steam roller methods of four years ago."

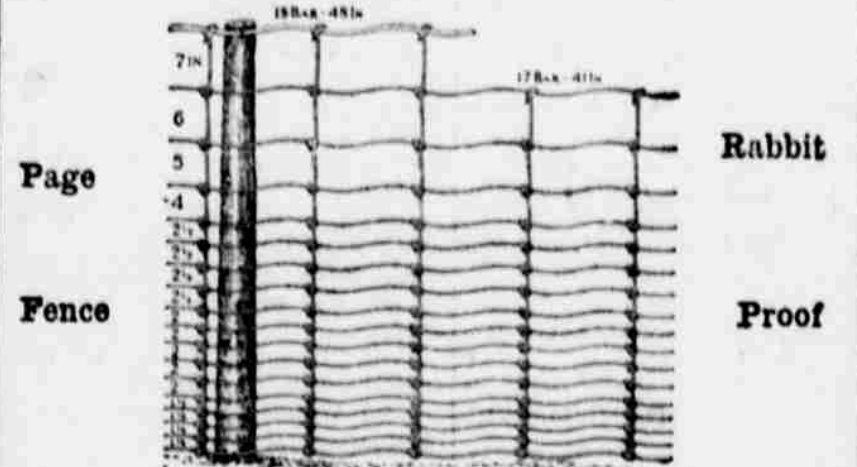
