

A LITTLE PRAISE FOR EVERYONE AT COURT HOUSE

In his report for the books and vouchers of county offices from January 1 to July 1, 1912, J. H. Wilson, the accountant having charge of the work, recommends that the county treasurer secure a guarantee bond from all banks in which Jackson county funds are placed. The report also states that it is not a good or safe plan for the county treasurer to loan any county funds, or to receive interest therefrom.

"I will say that Mr. Cronmiller has been approached with a proposition to place all the county funds in a single bank which would pay him \$100 a month, in addition to his salary for this favor. As county balances are ordinarily quite large, it is easy to see how a bank holding all the funds, knowing that they would be reasonably inactive, as to a large part of them, and getting 8 per cent out of them, could very well make this kind of a proposition. Mr. Cronmiller promptly declined this proposition."

In his report on the sheriff's office he says:

The ten tax rolls for 1911 and the manner in which the assessments appear thereon, scattered through the ten books, is responsible for the delays in making deposits. I have gone over this matter with the assessor and have suggested to him the propriety of compiling the assessment against each owner on one statement and entering that against him in one place on the roll. I think he will adopt a policy like this.

"The sheriff has been working under great disadvantages. Not only is he handicapped in this ten-roll proposition, which casts an immense burden on him and on his assistants, but his quarters are cramped and there is inadequate space to turn around in his office.

He is compelled during a portion of the tax collecting period to have a line of the work performed in his residence for want of space in the office.

Too much praise, for the very complete and careful record he has made, cannot be given him.

His collection register, on which all receipts are entered, and from which he makes his deposits, or "Turn Overs," to the treasury is a book to be proud of.

In the compilation of this record there is not a mistake to be found. This is a good record, it could not be better.

During the collecting period, Mr. Jones has had the assistance of one of the most competent men about the court house, Mr. R. B. Dow, in every department of the county Mr. Dow is thoroughly familiar, and questions which make most persons stop and ponder, and look up law, are to him easily answered. He is invaluable in the sheriff's office during a tax collecting period.

In the office force Mr. Jones has had very competent help. It is difficult to assemble skilled assistance for a short period, but he has been fortunate in this respect, and is a good judge of competent help. To this is largely due much of the excellent record he has put up.

Not only as tax collector, but as sheriff, as well, Mr. Jones has made good. He has a jail full of prisoners, most of the time, and with an active circuit court, sending out process constantly, he has all he can do.

The report also shows that Sheriff Jones still has \$80,099.53 on hand, aside from other money not yet received for. He is turning this money over as fast as he has it properly written up. The sheriff has collected and turned over \$527,188.94.

The clerk's and recorder's office are treated as follows:

"The county clerk's office is exceedingly well conducted. Mr. Coleman is in the office practically all official hours and has all county business pertaining to his office well in mind. With the appointment of the tax levies, the registration of voters, the preparation for elections and the exceedingly active circuit court, the county clerk of Jackson county has his hands full.

"The recorder's books are in excellent condition. Notwithstanding he has many very lengthy instruments constantly coming to him for record, he keeps the work of the office up to date all the time, seldom a day passing in which his work is not finished, or practically so.

"The balance in the treasury July 1, 1912, is \$118,148.77, as shown, and the total \$573,664.65.

CLEAN SWEEP BY AMERICANS AT STOCKHOLM

STOCKHOLM, July 8.—Though greatly cheered by their sweeping victories Sunday, the American athletes today did not under estimate the others and were worked doubly hard to make the third day keep up the pace they set up the first two days.

Events scheduled for today were the final 800 meters race, the honors in the semi-finals of which went to the Americans yesterday, the running high jump final, the trial of which yesterday resulted in six Americans being among the 11 who qualified; in the 10,000 meter run final, two of the three who qualified being Americans; standing broad jump, 10,000 meter walk, 40 meter relay.

The Americans in yesterday's events made almost a clean sweep. They won the 100 meters in one, two, three order, and it was the first time in the history of the Olympic games that three flags of any one nation were run up at the end of a single event. At the close of the day, the standings were:

United States, 10; Sweden, 3; Finland, 3; Norway, 2; Bohemia, 1.

These scores are exclusive of shooting, swimming and cycling points.

Ralph H. Craig of Detroit won the 100 meter dash in 10 4-5 seconds yesterday. Alva T. Meyer taking

second and Donald F. Lippincott, the record breaker of Saturday, taking third.
