

TILLMAN FIRM IN HIS BELIEF OF LORIMER'S PURITY

WASHINGTON, July 13.—Just before the Lorimer vote was taken, Senator Tillman, enfeebled and wane, obtained permission to have the clerk read a statement which he said he was too weak to read.

"I realize now that I have but little time before I must meet my maker," the statement declared. "I cast my vote today, secure in the conviction that Senator Lorimer had been elected without fraud."

Continuing, the statement paid high tribute to Lorimer's character and ability. Tillman's eyes were red with tears as his testimonial was read.

Lorimer emphatically refused to see newspaper men after his defeat. He gave his secretary orders to bar all reporters. He walked to his office in the senate office building and established guards outside against intruders.

CLEVELAND GRAYS TO VISIT OREGON CITIES

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 13.—The Cleveland Gray's Ohio's military organization, arrived here today 200 strong for a three day's visit. The Grays, accompanied by their wives and families, are making a tour of the Pacific Coast. They have already visited Southern California and after their sojourn here, will continue to Oregon.

A record of 75 years lies behind the Cleveland Grays. In their membership are numbered three generations of volunteer soldiers who fought in the Civil and Spanish American wars.

The Grays were met at the station here by the California Grays, whose guests they will be during their stay in San Francisco.

joined him. Senators Dillingham, Jones and others who voted for Lorimer joined him in the cloak room and bade him good bye.

Several Senators apfired Three senators were absent. Several were "paired" and could not vote. Senator Culbertson of Texas, originally voted to oust Lorimer and then, being paired with Dupont of Delaware, who was absent, withdrew his vote.

At 1:40 p. m. the minority resolution was called up, holding it to be the sense of the senate that William Lorimer's election was corrupt. "Resolved that corrupt methods and practices were employed in the election of William Lorimer to the senate, and his election, was, therefore invalid."

A roll call disclosed the presence of eighty-two senators. All seemed ready for a vote on the minority resolution when Senator Dixon of Montana arose. He denied Lorimer's charges that he had been involved in an effort to bribe certain southern delegates for Colonel Roosevelt.

Lorimer's ejection followed a three day's speech by the senator, dramatic and replete with invective for his opponents. Beginning Thursday, Lorimer had spoken in all 11 1/2 hours when he relinquished the floor at 1:30 this afternoon. Lorimer's fight for his official life, which ended this afternoon when the senate doors closed behind his bulky figure, began almost immediately after his election.

plot against him—the charge that he was corrupt as a congressman and that he had a contract with Lee O'Neil Browne.

"There were schemes to put Lorimer in the penitentiary," the Illinoisan declared. "It was necessary to bolster up this case. My opponents hired William J. Burns, who calls himself 'the great detective.' He put a venerable United States senator in his grave on testimony the president of the United States now believes was untrue."

Protected by Family

Appreciation was expressed by Lorimer of the kind things said about him by the senators. It was admitted, he said, that his private life was beyond reproach. He did not want that fact taken into consideration. Such a life brought its own reward.

"My family," the senator declared, "will not desert me. They will not consider it a disgrace. My wife and children will form a hollow square around me and protect me from the world. Surrounded by them, I am the happiest of living men."

3 DEAD, 13 HURT; WORST STORM IN MINNESOTA HISTORY

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., July 13.—Three persons dead, thirteen injured and property damage estimated at \$100,000 are the results of one of the worst storms in the history of the weather bureau last night and early today. The storm was confined almost entirely to Hennepin and Ramsey counties (Minneapolis and St. Paul,) although adjoining counties report heavy rains.

The dead: Ralph C. Gillette, 30, Minneapolis; instantly killed by lightning at the Interlachen Golf Links.

Mrs. Alma Boyer, 22, St. Paul. Mary Bergman, 5, St. Paul.

The maximum velocity of the wind in Minneapolis was 84 miles an hour. At Lakeview, forty members of the National Guard, in camp there, were shocked by lightning, four being rendered unconscious.

DENEEN PLEASD WITH OUSTING OF BOSS LORIMER

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., July 13.—If there is a popular clamor for the election of a successor to William Lorimer at once Governor Deneen may call a special session of the legislature. Several politicians have suggested to the governor that he appoint ex-Senator Hopkins, who was the people's choice at the primary held prior to the election of Lorimer.

The governor's statement follows: "I am not surprised at the vote in the senate. The facts were too plain for successful controversy. No one could explain on any reasonable and honest theory why 53 democrats would vote for Mr. Lorimer for senator as they did, or why four democrats should confess to receiving money for having voted for him. Nor could anyone disassociate this vote from the bi-partisan organization of the general assembly or the 'jackpot.'"

conspiracy to ruin the reputation of Mr. C. S. Funk.

"The public, I think, knows in a general way the enormous influences which had to do with the election of Mr. Lorimer, with the defense in the criminal courts and before the investigating committees of the state and national senates and the extraordinary efforts made to retain him in his seat.

"This case has attracted national attention and the people of our country, I think, will feel a sense of satisfaction in seeing the forces of law triumph over the influences which have been brought to bear to defeat it. It will strengthen their confidence in the law."

PANAMA CANAL BILL CONSIDERED IN SENATE

WASHINGTON, July 13.—Immediately after the announcement of the Lorimer vote a message from the house was presented to the senate submitting the Archbald impeachment case to the senate.

No action was taken. Senator Brandegee moved that the senate take up the bill to fix tolls on the Panama Canal.

A roll call was demanded, on the question of a quorum.

The senate made the Panama Canal bill the "unfinished business," giving it the right of way and temporarily sidetracking the Archbald case.

CLAUDE ALLEN JURY UNABLE TO AGREE

WYTHEVILLE, Va., July 13.—The jury in the case of Claude Allen, charge with complicity in the Hillsville murders in Judge Mastle's court room, reported a deadlock today and was discharged. Eight stood out for first degree murder and four for acquittal. Claude Allen is a son of Floyd Allen, patriarch of the Allen gang, who was recently convicted of murder in the first degree.

Notice to Taxpayers

The sheriff's office is sending out notices to all taxpayers whose personal tax does not show "paid." These notices are being sent out for the reason that heretofore the assessor has always assessed the personal property with the real estate and when real estate was paid, the whole tax was paid. This year, however, the assessor has placed all the personal property in a separate roll apart from the real estate. Many people pay the taxes on their real estate alone believing they have paid all their taxes. For this reason a considerable amount of personal tax shows unpaid on the personal tax roll.

Sheriff Jones believes that in justice to the taxpayers who have intended to pay all their taxes, they should be notified of their unpaid personal tax before the delinquent tax-list is published.

The notices are not a "dun" for taxes, but simply a notice that the personal tax shows unpaid.
