BLAME RAILROADS FOR BRITISH PROTEST

WASHINGTON, July 17.—Congressman Knowland of California, today told President Taft that American railroads, acting with Canadian transcontinental lines, had instigated England's protest against free tolls for American ships passing through the Panama canal. After his conference with the president, Knowland said:

"It is a railroad fight. Free tolls for American vessels means lower railroad rates. We built and financed the canal and congress will not concede England's right to dictate the tolls."

Knowland further declared that England had not thought of protesting until the American and Canadian railroads sent a delegation to England. He doubted whether America would be willing to submit the question to The Hague tribunal because all the foreign interests would be against America there.

The British protest is expected here tomorrow and it is believed President Taft will send a special message to congress voicing his views of the matter.

SHOOTING GIRL FOUND DRUGGED AND BOUND

NEW YORK, July 17.—Found, it is reported, with a chloroform saturated handkerchief bound over her mouth and her hands and feet securely tied, Miss Ethel Conrad, one of the "shooting show girls" recently acquitted of a charge of attempting to murder W. E. D. Stokes, the millionaire hotel man, is a patient in a local hospital today.

Miss Conrad said that a strange man followed her out of a subway station, after which her mind suddenly went blank. She refused to tell who she was until Miss Lillian Graham, the other "shooting show girl" identified her.

mobile and escaped while the police scarcely pretended to pursue and, instead, arrested a man who tried to give them the automobile's right number.

The public generally feels that the Rosenthal murder was the work of a secret organization which is defying the law, and Whitman's declaration, "I will not rest until everyone concerned is punished," is generally approved. Whitman promises to engage detectives to investigate the police evidence furnished him.

Policeman Loaned Money
The police intimate today that Louis Libby, who drove the automobile in which the murderers escaped and Shapiro, its owner, have given them the full facts of the tragedy, declaring that seven men participated in the killing of Rosenthal.

The grand jury today is probing into Rosenthal's testimony given before his death, when he declared that Lieutenant of Police Becker had loaned him \$1,500, in return for which he demanded 20 per cent of Rosenthal's gambling profits. It is reported Rosenthal also said he was forced to pay tribute to one of the highest police officials in the city, a man of international reputation.

Laurier Brands Alleged Nephew as Imposter

SAN FRANCISCO, July 17.—That C. H. Laurier, the young man who dropped out of sight on the eve of his marriage to a San Francisco girl, after, it is alleged, passing a worthless check for \$535 is not the nephew of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the former Canadian premier, was confirmed here today when letters were received from Sir Wilfrid branding the young man as an imposter. A warrant was issued for Laurier's arrest, sworn to by a local hotel man whom he is alleged to have defrauded, but his whereabouts is unknown.

FRANKLIN CALLED DARROW DEFENSE

LOS ANGELES, July 17.—Bert H. Franklin, confessed jury briber and star state witness, and John R. Harrington of Chicago, also a state witness, will be called to the witness stand by the defense in the Darrow trial tomorrow. This was admitted today by the defendant himself when he requested that the court order the men to report tomorrow to testify.

The nature of their probable testimony was not divulged, but it is generally believed that they will be asked to corroborate statements by defense witnesses who were called with the object of impeaching testimony given by Franklin when he appeared for the state.

Fremont Older, editor of a San Francisco daily newspaper, was called to the stand by the defense today. He testified that he furnished bail money for John R. Harrington when Harrington was jailed in San Francisco for refusing to answer questions asked him when he was called before the Los Angeles county grand jury.
