RALPH WILLIAMS A TAFT MANAGER

NEW YORK, July 20.—The executive committee of the republican national committee, which will manage President Taft's campaign for reelection was announced this afternoon by National Chairman Charles D. Hilles as follows:

J. T. Adams, Iowa; Charles F. Brooker, Connecticut; Frederick Esterbrook, New Hampshire; James P. Goodrich, Indiana; Alvah T. Martin, Virginia; T. H. Niedringhaus, Missouri; S. A. Perkins, Tacoma, Wash.; Alfred T. Rogers, Wisconsin; Newell Sanders, Tennessee; Charles D. Warren, Michigan; Roy O. West, Illinois; Ralph Williams, Dallas, Oregon.

All the new members of the committee agreed to devote their entire time until election to the management of the campaign. Brooker, Esterbrook, Goodrich, Martin and Sanders will remain at the New York headquarters, Niedringhaus, Rogers, Warren and West will direct the Chicago headquarters and Perkins and Williams will have charge on the Pacific Coast. The place for the Pacific Coast headquarters has not yet been selected.

TRYING TO RESCUE CHINESE REPUBLIC

PEKIN, July 20.—Embarrassed and harassed in his attempts to reconcile the factions in the national assembly and secure his appointments of an imperial cabinet, it is reported that President Yuan Shi Kai today believes that his regime is endangered. The dissensions in the new republican government are being blamed on foreign interference in China's affairs.

Li Yuan Hung and Dr. Sun Yat Sen, though politically strongly opposed to President Yuan, are today co-operating with him in an effort to effect a compromise which will save the new republic.

SCANDAL PROBERS LIVES THREATENED

NEW YORK, July 20.—District Attorney Whitman and others active in running down the assassins of Herman Rosenthal, the gambler who was killed, it is suspected by the police, for squealing, were notified today by anonymous letters that if their efforts to ferret out the mystery do not stop, they, too, will be assassinated.

Despite this, Whitman declared today that the men who killed Rosenthal are known and that he will never quit their trail until they are run down and punished. There is no doubt that the underworld is determined to go to any length to stop the probe, and grave fears are felt that other killings are planned.

Whitman's detectives are investigating everyone connected in any way with the Rosenthal murder. Lieutenant Becker, who has been connected with the killing in remote ways and who is known to have been an intimate of the dead gambler, is still on duty at police headquarters. Commissioner Waldo refuses to remove him until formal charges are filed.

WILSON IS DRAFTING LETTER OF ACCEPTANCE

SEA GIRT, N. J., July 20.—Governor Woodrow Wilson spent this morning in drafting his letter of acceptance of the democratic presidential nomination. This afternoon 200 congressmen are expected to arrive on a special train to visit the nominee. A reception to them will be held on the lawn and veranda of the "Little white house."

Clark delivered a congratulatory address and presented Governor Wilson with a leather-bound book containing autographs of the democratic members of the house. Wilson replied with a speech of thanks, in which he said: "The country expects us to make living easier. That is a more solemn duty because of its difficulty. And it is in that duty that I wish to be your partner and your comrade."
