BONFILS IS FIGHTING SANCTITY OF COURTS

DENVER, Colo., July 25.—F. G. Bonfils, one of the owners of the Denver Post, a newspaper, appeared this afternoon in Judge Shattuck's court to answer charges of criminal contempt as a result of the Post's discussion of the \$500,000 libel suit which William Evans, president of the Denver Tramway company, has filed against the Post. "I propose to work," Bonfils told the court, "until this damnable power which makes us a nation of serfs is taken out of the hands of judges. The law permitting a judge to punish citizens for statements made outside of the court room is a revision of the dark ages."

ROOSEVELT GIVES HIS IDEAS OF NEW PARTY

NEW YORK, July 25.—In an editorial in the current number of the Outlook, Theodore Roosevelt gives his idea of what the new party should be. He says: "The party should not contain utterly incongruous elements, radically divided upon the real issues and acting together only on false, dead issues which are insincerely painted as real and vital. Judge by this standard, both the old parties break down. Neither can longer be trusted to do the work the country urgently needs. Bosses of the republican and democratic parties alike have a closer grip than ever before on the party machines of the states and the nation."

HINSHAW TO MANAGE PROHIBITION CAMPAIGN

PORTLAND, Ore., July 25.—Virgil G. Hinshaw, a Portland attorney, is today preparing to leave for Chicago to take charge of the campaign headquarters of the prohibition party. Hinshaw, although not a candidate for the position and who did not attend the recent convention at Atlantic City, was selected by the prohibition party as chairman of the national committee. Unlike the other parties, the prohibitionists maintain headquarters continually and Hinshaw states that at the conclusion of this campaign he will immediately begin preparation for the campaign of 1916.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 25.—"My children are starving. I did it for them. You will remember that the stuff I stole was from their father, my husband, and that I sold it to put food in their mouths." This was the plea here today of Mrs. B. Signorilli to the charge of theft of a quantity of wine from her husband's store Mrs. Signorilli, who has been separated from her husband for five months, was discharged.

DARROW FAILS TO OUST JUROR FOR PREJUDICE

LOS ANGELES, Cal., July 25.—Judge Hutton overruled the motion of the defense in the Darrow case and the trial will proceed again this afternoon with Juror Leavitt in the box. The court refused to hear the defense witnesses in an attempt to disqualify Leavitt. When court convened Attorney Earl Rogers charged in open court that Juror J. A. Leavitt who has been absent from the trial for the past three days, causing a delay in the proceedings, had expressed opinions of Darrow's guilt before being called for jury duty, and attempted to cause the juror's dismissal from the case. In closing his argument Rogers said: "The only question now is whether or not we shall go ahead with this farce. If this juror has a state of mind indicated by statements of friends and relatives, our efforts are futile. We are doing an idle and useless thing if what we hear is true, we sit here twiddling our fingers and trying our case to no purpose." John Cort is to produce a satirical farce called "The Richest Man in the World," by Arthur Gillespie and Coffin Davis.

ROBBERS LOOT BANK OF \$1500

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 25.—At 1:30 this afternoon two highwaymen, apparently foreigners, held up the Northern Crown Bank at Central Park, a suburb of this city, secured \$1,500 and made good their escape. The manager, C. C. Temple, was beaten into insensibility and a clerk was seriously clubbed. The manager was struck on the head with a "blimpy" and rendered unconscious while the clerk was so dazed by the blow he received that he was unable to offer resistance. Several other persons in the bank at the time were so cowed that they did nothing to prevent the looting or to intercept the robbers. The men jumped into a buggy and drove hurriedly away in a southerly direction. They are described as the traditional "long and short men." Squads of police are scouring the whole countryside but they have little to work on the way of clues. ENGLAND FEARS GERMAN WAR SAYS CONSERVATIVE

LONDON, July 25.—Marked difference of opinion concerning the likelihood of England becoming involved with Germany was expressed in the House of Commons today by two of England's public men. Referring to the speech of Winston Churchill, in which he said that England would double Germany's naval program, Premier Asquith said: "England has no quarrel with anyone, and it covets no additional territory." Andrew Bonar Law, conservative leader, expressed a conflicting opinion.
