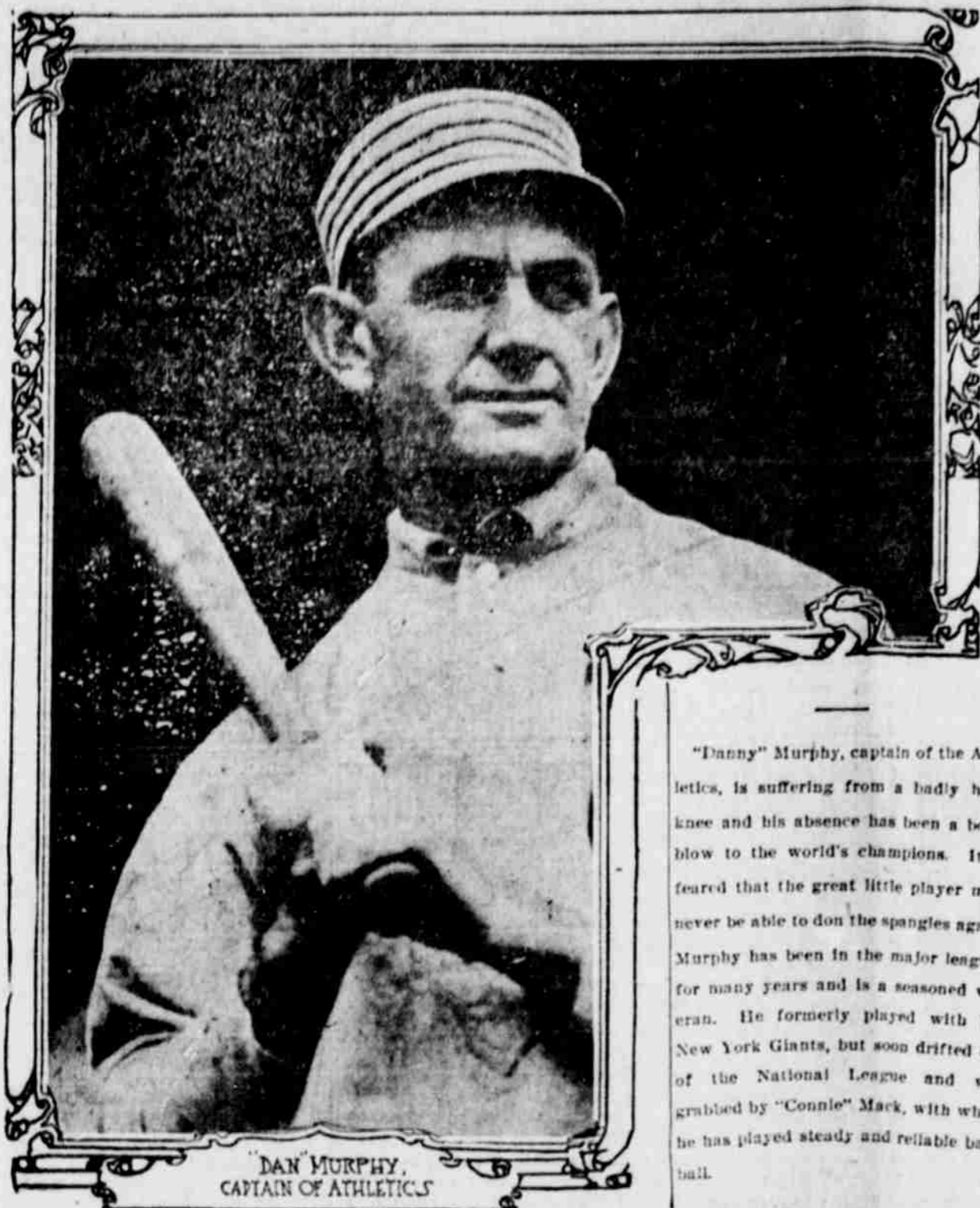

\$3.60 A BOX FOR BARTLETT PEARS

Bartlett pears from California sold for as high as \$3.60 a box in the New York market Tuesday according to advices received today by the Rogue River Fruit and Produce association. Many cars were offered, the fruit ranging from \$2.40 up to \$3.60. The Philadelphia market where \$3 is considered a top price, paid \$3.10 a box for several carloads. The Chicago market was off paying an average of \$2.25. The offerings from California are the heaviest now in the pear history of that state. The top shipment for quantity was reached Wednesday. Over 400 cars have been sold this week in eastern markets. From this time on the shipments will decrease.

IOWANS FAVOR POSTMASTERS ELECTED BY DIRECT VOTE

DES MOINES, July 25.—The state convention of the progressive party has adopted a platform containing a plan declaring for the direct election of postmasters by their constituents. The convention chose a full set of delegates to the national convention at Chicago, organized a working state committee and provided for the congressional districts and county organization. The platform is mainly devoted to the national issues. It condemns the republican national convention and the republican national committee, severely censures President Taft and denounces what is termed his subservience to the special interests, eulogizes Roosevelt as "the foremost man of the world" and declares for his nomination and election. Presidential primaries, direct election of United States senators, initiative and referendum were also endorsed.

CHILD YEARNS FOR LOVE OF MOTHER

SAN FRANCISCO, July 25.—"I only know that I just want to learn to sing and that I love my mother dearly," was the answer little, slim, golden-haired Dixie Burgess, with a voice liquid as a bird's, gave here today to Judge Coffey when asked if she wanted to become the adopted daughter of Professor Thor Rajee, of the Pacific Musical Institute. Then Dixie sang an aria from an Italian opera for Judge Coffey and he today has signed papers granting Rajee guardianship of the child. Mrs. Burgess herself is bedridden and unable to provide her daughter with the necessary training. Professor Rajee told Judge Coffey that Dixie's voice betters that of both Patti and Jenny Lind at the same age, covering a range of three octaves. "I believe you have come into a great inheritance, my little girl," said Judge Coffey. "Your voice is as sweet as any I have ever heard."

The advance guard of the delegates to the Pacific Highway convention to be held in San Francisco early in August, will reach Medford next Saturday afternoon when J. T. Ronald of Seattle, president of the Pacific Highway association with a party filling eight automobiles, arrives. Saturday night will be spent in this city. Over 100 automobiles filled with men interested in the movement will pass through Medford during the next week on their way to San Francisco. Most of them will return by way of Medford, visiting Crater Lake enroute to Seattle.

SCRIPPS PAPER SUED FOR RAILROAD LIBEL

SACRAMENTO, Cal., July 25.—The Sacramento Star, a Scripps paper, faces today three libel suits for \$50,000 each, at the hands of the Vallejo and Northern Railroad, the Northern Electric Railway and T. T. C. Gregory, president of the Vallejo and Northern. The papers have been filed in the superior court at Woodland, Yolo county. Each suit charges that the Star maliciously reported that a railroad bridge over the Sacramento River at Sacramento, for which Sacramento and Yolo counties had paid a proportion of the cost, had actually cost less than the figures named by the railroads. The Star announces today that it welcomes the suits, which it will oppose.

All that portion of the city south of the center of Main street from 4 a. m. to 10 a. m. only.

Irrigating with open hose or allowing water to run from any tap or faucet for irrigating without using a hose on which there is a sprinkler or a nozzle, is an offense and punishable as cited in ordinance No. 669.
