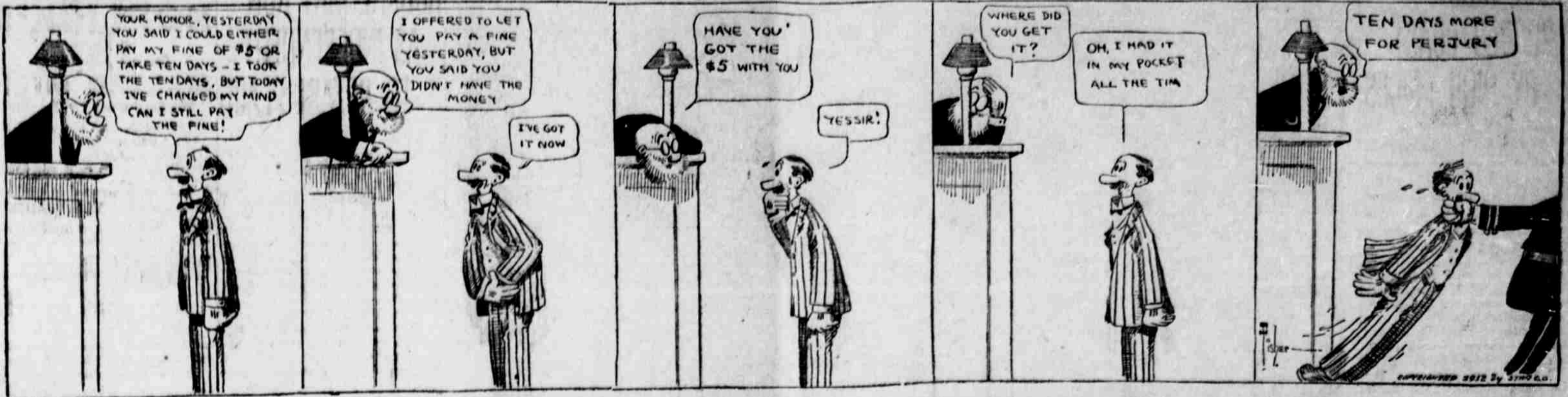

SEATTLE, Wn., July 25.—Resolutions endorsing the proposal of Congressman Victor Berger, to ask for a grand jury investigation of the alleged relations between Judge C. H.
