

### SUGAR TRUST ROBBED COAST BY HIGH PRICES

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 25.—Not alone was the California sugar consumer compelled by the sugar trust to pay all the traffic would bear, but that he was arbitrarily charged more than the consumer of any other state, due to collusion between the American Sugar Refining Company and its local subsidiaries, was brought out at the hearing here today of the dissolution suit before Special Examiner Brice.

This testimony was in the shape of letters exchanged between H. O. Havemeyer, late head of the trust, and W. H. Hannam, secretary of the Western and the Speckels Sugar Refining Companies, and Havemeyer's personal representative in California.

Further light was shed on the clandestine negotiations whereby the California-Hawaiian Company was persuaded for a sum of \$200,000, paid annually by the Western, to close its plant at Crockett, thus giving the trust an absolutely clear field.

### BLUES AND REDS IN SHAM BATTLE

CENTRALIA, Wash., July 25.—Concealing their intentions for the day, the red attacking army under command of Colonel Kennon broke camp at Porter, 13 miles west of Gate City at six o'clock this morning and marched eastward. The army will probably proceed as far as Elma, four miles west of Gate City, a point that until today was held by the second battalion of the second regiment of Washington National Guards, acting as outpost for the blue army.

This battalion abandoned Gate City and dropped back to join the main body of the blue army of defense under command of Colonel Young which drpped from Rochester, three miles east of Gate City, early today. The blue army will probably march about eight miles today, bringing the

### BOURNE MAY RUN AS INDEPENDENT TO RETAIN PLACE

PORTLAND, Ore., July 25.—It is believed today that should Senator Jonathan Bourne Jr., of Oregon, become a candidate for re-election it will be upon an independent ticket without renouncing his allegiance to the republican party, and avoiding as far as possible any mention of issues set forth in the republican national platform as adopted by the Chicago convention. No mention of the senator's name was made at the state progressive party convention today, nor was the possibility of his becoming a candidate discussed outside of the convention hall by those in attendance.

Close personal friends of Senator Bourne declare, however, that in their minds there is no doubt but that he will be a candidate for re-election on an independent ticket with no other platform than that furnished by his record in the senate during the past six years.

Senator Bourne has written that he will come to Oregon after the close of congress and, it is believed, he will, after looking over the field, make definite announcement as to the course he will pursue during the coming campaign.

It is declared by many of Bourne's close political friends that numerous men of prominence in the state who supported Ben Selling for the republican nomination, have grown cold in their feelings toward the Portland merchant and would welcome Senator Bourne's advent into the field.

It is declared that Senator Bourne attributes his defeat at his recent primaries to the fact that he did not set forth for the benefit of rural voters his accomplishments during his term in the senate.
