"We believe that a representative government should represent all classes of a community which cannot be definitely shown to be a menace to the community."

WILL INSTRUCT BOYS TO SHOOT

Captain Collins, U. S. A., from Eugene will be in the valley next week to visit the national guard companies at Ashland and Medford. Mr. Collins who is stationed at Fort Stevens, Oregon, has been assigned to this regiment as instructor of artillery.

Sargent Grandee has been assigned to the Ashland and Medford companies as a special instructor from the regular army. He is making his headquarters in this city as this company is a new organization and is spending much time at drill.

The annual maneuvers of the coast artillery will be held at Fort Stevens during August. At the last maneuvers the Ashland company was especially commended for their work on the big guns and after a year's study it is expected that they will make a much better showing this year.

PHOENIX FORMS SUFFRAGE CLUB

Thursday afternoon the organization committee of the Medford Equal Suffrage Association met the ladies of Phoenix at the home of Mrs. S. P. Cope. After the visitors had explained the object of their coming a suffrage club was organized with a charter membership of sixteen, the largest membership list with which any local club has begun work.

With Miss Cope as temporary chairman the following officers were elected: President, Mrs. Lillian Coleman; vice-president, Mrs. Eva Carliss; secretary, Miss Anna Towne; treasurer, Mrs. Nannie Roberts. These officers, together with Miss Susie A. Cope, make up the executive committee. These ladies hope to do their work so well that when the suffrage for women amendment is voted on in November there will not be one dissenting vote in their part of the county.

The regular weekly meeting of the Medford Suffrage Club will be held in the headquarters in the Sparta building from 3 to 5 p. m., Saturday.

present located except Sam Schepps, one of those who rode in the "murder automobile" when it stopped before the Metropole hotel where Rosenthal was slain. The police claim to be putting forth every effort to get on Schepps' trail. He is said to be involved in the confession made to District Attorney Whitman by William Shapiro, co-owner and chauffeur of the automobile in which the assassins escaped.

Morfe Arrests Made "Dago Frank" Murato, who is also known as Palmer and Girofief, was arrested here last night in the flat of Rosa Harris in Harlem. He is being held incommunicado and probably will be given the third degree in an attempt to force from him such details of the Rosenthal crime as will clear up some of the mystery still hanging over the sensational killing.

Only one of the suspects mentioned has not been delivered to the police. This is "Lefty" Loewey, the East Side thug who vanished from New York immediately after the Rosenthal killing. Loewey is said to be hiding in Toledo, Ohio, after a conference in Chicago with Charles Erbsstein, a lawyer friend, who today is said to be in New York bargaining with Whitman for immunity for the gangster in return for a full confession, implicating the "higher ups" who are believed to have instigated the killing of Rosenthal in an effort to prevent his disclosures of the identity of those who ruled the city sufficiently to protect the gamblers paying tribute to the police.

Loewey is Watched It is believed by many that District Attorney Whitman already has Loewey under surveillance, that the alleged efforts of Erbsstein to protect his client will bear no fruit, and that Loewey will be arrested and brought back to New York just as soon as the net closes about Schepps and the case is complete for the exposure of the big men behind the Rosenthal crime.

FIGHT DESPERATELY TO SAVE LIVES

UNIONTOWN, Pa., July 26.—One hundred members of a rescuing party are battling desperately today to save the lives of Peter Evans, John Scanlon and John Groschak, three miners who are marooned in the flood waters at the Lamont mine No. 2. The men were caught about 1,800 feet from the mouth of the mine in several feet of water and their cries for help can be easily heard. Pumps are being worked by scores of men in an effort to reduce the quantity of water.

The death list as a result of the flood of water sent into the mine following Tuesday's cloudburst still stands at 14.

VICTORIA PROPERTY IN TITLE MUDDLE

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 26.—By a decision rendered today by the privy council in London the titles to millions of dollars worth of real estate in this city are thrown into a chaotic condition and there is almost a panic among property owners throughout the entire city.

The case decided is a suit brought by former Mayor R. A. Anderson against the suburban municipality of South Vancouver to recover title to land transferred under an ordinance passed by the board of aldermen at a meeting in 1897. This meeting was held in the city of Vancouver proper instead of in South Vancouver and the point Anderson raised was that their action was consequently illegal. The case has gone through all the Canadian courts and Anderson's contention is finally sustained by the court of last resort.

VANDAL DOES MUCH DAMAGE AT CRATER LAKE

Word comes from Crater Lake to the effect that when Manager Parkhurst of the Crater Lake company, arrived at the lodge he found that an unknown vandal had done much damage to the camp during the winter months.

The store rooms had been broken open and the supplies that were not eaten were scattered around the camp. Wood was thrown on the carpets; asphaltum was boiled in enamel lined ware, dining room tables were sawed up, holes were chipped in the floors, the entire supply of firewood was burned, lead pencils were thrown over the place, and general ruin was discernible everywhere.

The work of repairing the damage has occupied considerable time, and the cost has been considerable. No evidence was found to indicate that the vandal was a trapper. A man was seen coming from the vicinity of the camp last March. He was described by those who saw him passing through Fort Klamath as the hardest looking specimen seen in that section in ages. This is believed to have been the man who committed the depredations.

How he was able to get to the camp in the winter time is a mystery. And how he was able to travel from Arant camp to the rim, loaded down with provisions, is another problem hard to solve.

RAILROAD READY FOR CANAL OPENING

NEW YORK, July 26.—For the purpose of starting a line of steamships to ply between New York and Philadelphia and cities along the Pacific Coast when the Panama Canal is completed, the Pennsylvania railroad, it was reported today, is getting options on an immense tract of land along the Delaware River.

The alleged activity of the Pennsylvania railroad is being used by independent ship owners as a basis to memorialize congress to give the independents a free passage through the canal and to place a toll on the lines owned or controlled by the railroads.
