BATTLE RAGES

(Continued from page 1.) The detectives and miners came Thursday, when Detective William Springer and William Phaup, head of the Baldwin forces, attempted to ride through Muclow on a handcar. They were attacked from ambush, and Springer, riddled with bullets, fell from the car and rolled down an embankment. Phaup was badly wounded. Residents of the Paint Creek district are terrorized. Refuges arriving here say that more than 5,000 shots have been exchanged between the two factions and that hundreds of homes have been riddled by stray bullets. Two Detectives Slain Just how many of the miners have been slain, if any, is not known. The Baldwin Detective Agency, however, has lost two men—William Springer and Gus Pinson. Phaup, who is in a hospital here with a bullet in each arm, will recover. Adjutant General Elliot and camped at Muclow. It is not believed that this small force will be effective in restoring order, as the miners and their sympathizers are fully aroused. Hope of restoration of a normal state of affairs in the district lies in the arrival of the three companies of National Guard which left Charleston today for the Paint Creek section. Detectives Accused Around the mouth of Paint Creek, the residents charge that the private guards are guilty of depredations. Stories have been told of frightful attacks on women and children, and this, it is said, is responsible for the clash between the detectives and strikers. Woodsmen have joined the miners and are said to have participated in a pitched battle with detectives near Muclow yesterday in which 3,000 shots were exchanged. The force of miners and woodsmen numbered 600. It is feared the battle will be renewed today. The wives and children of the miners are starving and the strikers are attacking the companies' stores. The sympathy of the residents along the creek is with the miners, who say that the guards have been guilty of frightful brutalities. An unconfirmed report that strikers threw a bomb into the barracks occupied by guards yesterday, killing several, reached here this afternoon. It was said the guards fear to leave the barracks except in crowds. SEATTLE, Wash., July 27.—Mayor George F. Cotterill, Fire Chief Frank L. Stetson and H. J. Huhn, police department chauffeur, have been constructively arrested today on warrants issued yesterday by City Attorney Pierce charging them with using city automobiles for other than city business. Councilman A. J. Goddard, the anti-automobile champion, swore out the warrants.
