BARTLETTS BRING \$3.10 NEW YORK

Schobel & Day issue the following under date of New York, July 22.—Today, (Monday) there were 23 cars of California deciduous fruit auctioned here, and we are glad to report a continued strong market. Pears: There were 3800 boxes and 1300 half boxes of Bartletts, equaling about 8 solid cars sold. Outside of the New England, Delta and Dean brands, all of the other river Bartletts today, averaged \$2.85 against \$3.10 for Sacramento fruit handled by us. This is the heaviest offering so far, of the season, and the market may be valued \$2.75 to \$3.12, with a very lively demand. Peaches: Too few from California to quote. 90 cars of Georgias on the Pennsylvania wharf, the strike having ended, but hardly any were sound. The carriers sold from 50 cents to \$1.25—the great bulk around \$1.00. The late heavy rains in Georgia did great damage and we doubt if the balance of that crop interferes as much as was anticipated in the offerings of Pacific Coast deciduous fruit.
