DUEL RESULTS FROM QUARREL OVER WATER

WEAVERVILLE, Cal., July 30.—A dispute over a water right led Samuel W. Heller and Bruce A. Trimble, well known farmers on the Trinity River to engage in a duel with bullets. Trimble fired four times, hitting Heller once and breaking his leg. Heller fired twice at Trimble, one bullet piercing his ear.
