

DRUNK, THREATENS TO KILL PARENTS; POLICE GET BUSY

William Hendrickson of Talent was taken into custody Tuesday evening at Talent charged with threatening to kill his parents and a married sister. The matter was settled out of court today, Hendrickson being repentant having recovered his senses. Liquor is said to have made him unaccountable for his actions.

Hendrickson is said to have been unruly in this city in the afternoon but as he left the city the police took no action. He reached his home between Phoenix and Talent and there is said to have threatened to kill his father and mother but stated that first he wished to kill his sister who lives at Talent. A younger brother rode to Medford for help while Hendrickson was speeding in a buggy toward Talent. The local officers telephoned to the marshal at Talent who arrested the man when he reached his sister's home. Officers Cingade and Shearer went to Ashland and took the man into custody.

No gun was found on Hendrickson when arrested although he is said to have had one when he threatened his parents.

Hendrickson today, sober, was repentant and on the plea of his parents was allowed to go.

MISS SNODGRASS MURDER VICTIM

CATSKILL, N. Y., July 31.—That Miss Dorcas Snodgrass, the Mount Vernon, nurse, whose body was found in Catskill Creek after she had been mysteriously missing for several days, may have been the victim of foul play was indicated here today in a report returned by Dr. Rooney of Albany, who made a post mortem examination.

Although Dr. Rooney admits that death was due to drowning, he maintains that the shallowness of the water in which the body was found proves that Miss Snodgrass was unconscious and inert when placed in the creek.

District Attorney Wilbur ordered a thorough investigation of the case today, and startling developments are expected. The body was sent to Mount Vernon today for burial.

Miss Snodgrass disappeared from her home on the day she was to leave for Oakland, Cal., where her brother-in-law is superintendent of construction of a trolley line.
