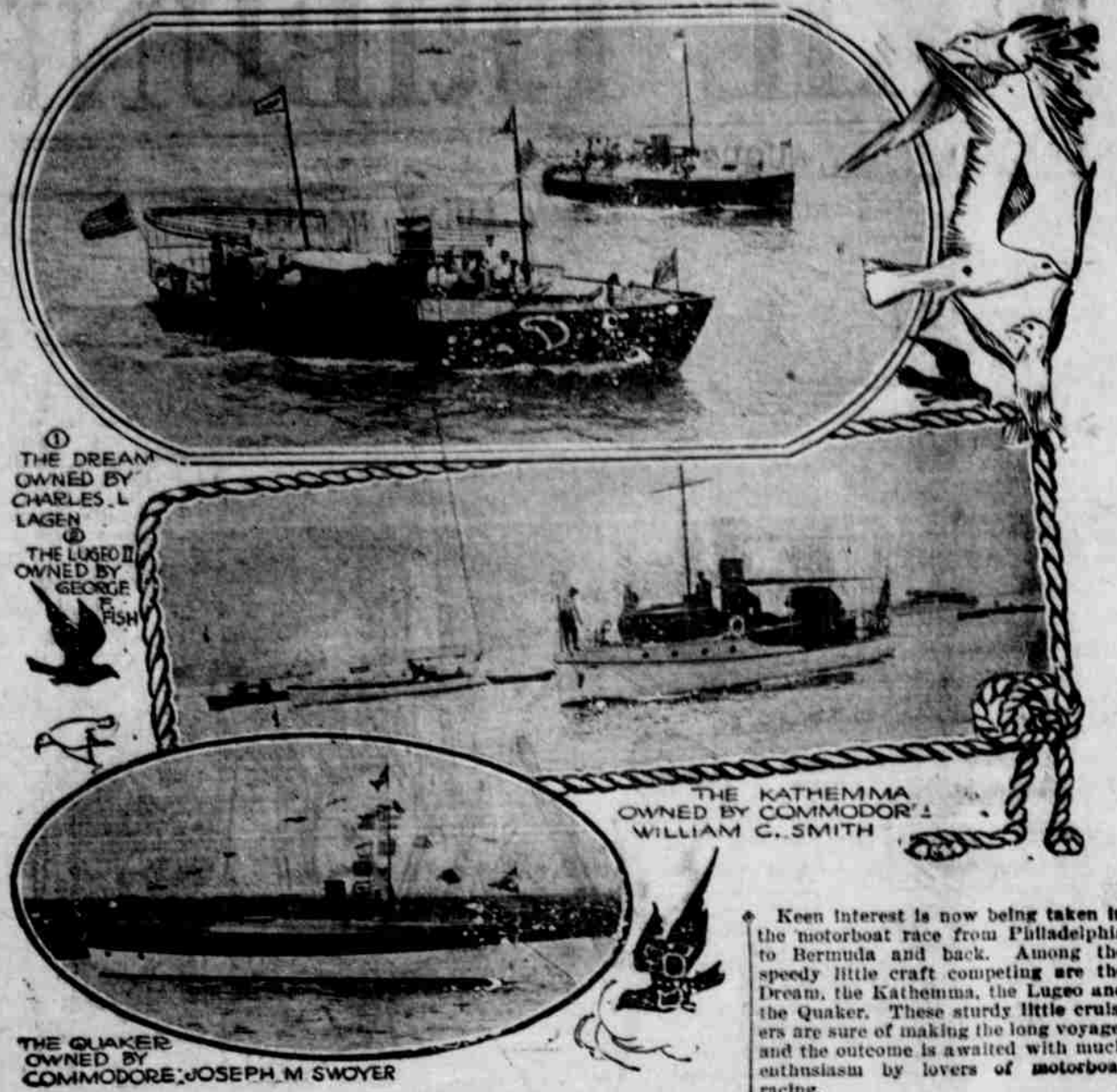

SEEK TO IMPEACH JUSTICE WRIGHT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—The way for impeachment proceedings against Justice Daniel T. Wright of the supreme court of the District of Columbia, was opened today in charges made by Attorney Francis Tobin in a letter to Speaker Champ Clark.

Tobin demanded that the impeachment of Wright be secured, charging him with frequently violating his oath of office, and that he was influenced by the Bucks Stove and Range Company in rendering his decision in the contempt cases against Samuel Gompers, John Mitchell and Frank Morrison, all prominent labor leaders.
