

CRATER LAKE BEST ATTRACTION SEEN 60,000 MILE TRIP

Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Henderson and son Charles arrived in the city by automobile Wednesday evening by way of eastern Oregon and Crater Lake from St. Paul, Minn., and left this morning for San Francisco. They expect to motor eastward to their home by way of Salt Lake City, Crater Lake was the western destination and they declare that they were more than repaid for their long trip overland by one glimpse of the lake.

"We are thorough believers in the 'See America First' theory as evolved by James J. Hill," states Mr. Henderson, "and we have motored to all of the great scenic attractions of the United States. Two years ago we traveled eastward to Niagara Falls and other eastern scenic attractions journeying down the Hudson which is a wonderful automobile trip. Last year we motored through Yellowstone and to the Grand Canyon of the Colorado. We have traveled nearly 60,000 miles in the United States by automobile and are traveling over six months each year.

"This year we decided to tour the northwest and visit Crater Lake and we feel more than repaid for the trip. The lake is the most beautiful single bit of scenery in the United States and I believe this after seeing many more noted attractions. The trip down Rogue River is a wonderful drive. Some day thousands of machines will travel over that road annually for it is really worth while.

"We have never been in Yosemite valley but expect to visit it this year. Then we will tour eastward stopping at Lake Tahoe. We know the rocks fairly well now.

"Crater Lake is wonderful. All it needs to make it the leading scenic attraction on the Pacific Coast is advertising and an automobile highway."

NET TIGHTENS ABOUT BECKER WHEN ACCOMPLICES RELATE

NEW YORK, July 31.—Police Lieutenant Becker, charged with investigating the Rosenthal murder was further implicated tonight in a plot to get rid of the gambler when "Bald Jack" Rose and "Bridget" Webber added another chapter to their amazing allegations.

They told District Attorney Whitman Rosenthal was to have been killed at the instigation of Becker 10 days before he met his fate and the plot failed because the underworld thugs selected to do the murder lost their nerve.

"The plot that failed" was brought to a climax at the Garden restaurant July 6, when Rosenthal and wife were dining there, according to Rose. Rose himself engineered the "job" and brought to the restaurant a "fleet of thugs" to do the actual shooting.

Two of the hired assassins were "Gyp the Blood" and "Lefty Lou" now wanted as two of the men who actually shot Rosenthal in front of the Metropolitan.

Becker at the time was down town, Rose said, waiting for the murder plot to be consummated.

"He talked to me every day," Rose said, "and kept saying 'Why don't you kill this fellow off?'"

"Rosenthal would have been killed that night if the bunch hadn't lost their nerve," added Rose.

Webber said shortly after the murder Becker met Rose and himself and told him to give the "boys money to get out of town," promising to "fix it up later" with Webber.

Whitman has so far obtained little real evidence against the men mentioned by Rose as heads of the "four graft bureaus."

TRY TO MPEACH DARROW'S TESTIMONY WITH TELEGRAMS

LOS ANGELES, July 31.—Telegraph messages interchanged by Clarence Darrow and Leo Rappaport were the storm center about which the Darrow trial revolved today. The prosecution introduced a message with the avowed intention of impeaching Darrow's statement that when Franklin was arrested, negotiations had already been completed for the pleas of guilty by the McNamara.

The messages referred to expenditure of money to secure possession of correspondence in the files of the structural iron workers at Indianapolis.

Rappaport asked for \$1,000 to regain "Indianapolis evidence," and Darrow's reply acquiesced in the expenditure.

Explaining his action Darrow said these documents were wanted at that time and are wanted now by the structural iron workers.

HARRY VALLON

Harry Vallon, professional gambler and close associate of men known to have been hostile to Herman Rosenthal, who was killed in New York's Tenderloin, denies that he had anything to do with the crime. He declares he was asleep when the murder was committed, but admits riding in "Bridget" Webber's car on the night that Rosenthal was slain. Vallon is being held as a material witness. Detectives of the William J. Burns agency have been employed to investigate the gambling situation and particularly its connection with the police. Mrs. Rosenthal, wife of the victim, has given facts to the District Attorney which may prove of value in running down the murderers. The name of Lieutenant Becker, of the Police Department, continues to figure in the investigation.

FIVE GOVERNORS MEET AT BOISE

BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 1.—With five governors in attendance and two more due to arrive during the day, the first annual conference of western governors convened here today. Governors West of Oregon, Spuy of Utah, Norris of Montana, Oddie of Nevada and Hawley of Idaho, were present when the visiting executives were formally welcomed to the city this morning. Governors Burke of North Dakota and McDonald of New Mexico are en route and will be on hand for public reception to be tendered tonight.

Governor Norris made the first address at the morning session speaking on the conservatism question and advocating states control of resources. This subject will be further considered and will be one of the chief topics before the conference.

Tomorrow Idaho's new million dollar capitol will be formally opened with the visiting executives in attendance. The conference is the outgrowth of the trip of western governor's special last year, and it is proposed to make it an annual affair.

PROGRESSIVE LAWYERS TO SECEDE FROM ASSOCIATION

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 1.—Declaring that the present state bar association is controlled by stand-pat corporation lawyers, progressive attorneys here today are planning to organize an independent state association.

The speeches made by the corporation lawyers yesterday at the Tacoma meeting denouncing the trend towards popular government and the endorsement of ex-Judge Hanford by the association came as the climax which will likely cause a majority of the attorneys of the state to form the new organization.

Arthur Capper, the Topeka editor, and Frank J. Ryan of Leavenworth are contesting for the republican gubernatorial nomination in Kansas. The nomination will be made in the general primary next week.

CLOUDBURSTS FLOOD COLORADO TOWNS

DENVER, Colo., Aug. 1.—Raging torrents caused by cloudbursts in several districts have inundated several towns and damaged thousands of dollars worth of property as well as marooning hundreds of tourists in Colorado Springs.

Anxiety is felt today for farmers near Colorado Springs owing to a telephone message that the Monument dam was weakening.

JEALOUS AUTHORESS SHOOT AND MURDERS HER RIVAL

PARIS, Aug. 1.—Madame Block, a writer, resenting the alleged attachment between her husband and Mrs. Minnie Bridgeman, an American, shot and killed the latter here in her apartments. Madame Block stated that she had appealed to Mrs. Bridgeman, but without avail.

The victim was the wife of James E. Bridgeman, cashier of the New York Life Insurance company from whom she is said to have long been separated.

INITIATIVE ADVOCATES CALLED DRATTEST FOOLS

TACOMA, Wash., Aug. 1.—Angered by the address of President W. T. Dorell, who decried popular government, and the diatribe against the initiative and referendum by W. C. Bristol, of Portland, progressive lawyers last evening at the annual convention of the Washington state bar association, started the fireworks with caustic rebukes. Attorney Bristol had said: "There are 92 million of the drattest fools that ever inhabited the face of the earth," when speaking of those favoring the initiative and referendum.

DENVER, Colo., July 31.—The marriage of Miss Harriet Platt, daughter of the late Mrs. Sarah Platt Decker, the noted suffragist and woman's club leader, and Caldwell Martin, a well known Denver lawyer, was quietly celebrated today. It is said to have been the request of Mrs. Decker on her death-bed that her daughter's wedding should not be postponed.

WALSH REFEREES ATTELL-MURPHY GO

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 1.—Undeterred by the terrific roasting his decision in the Wolgast-Rivers fight at Los Angeles July 4 received from sporting writers all over the country, Jack Welsh of San Francisco will referee the Attell-Murphy fight here next Saturday.

This announcement was made today to the United Press by James W. Coffroth, promoter of the contest which Attell expects will rehabilitate him in the eyes of the fight fans and, incidentally, remove from their memories the cries of fake which followed the last battle of the pair here.

"Welsh was chosen as referee for the Attell-Murphy fight when the articles were first signed," said Coffroth this afternoon, "and the arrangements will not be changed."

When it was intimated that serious criticism had been expressed of Welsh's actions in the Wolgast-Rivers bout, Coffroth declared that the events of the Fourth would make no difference.
