SISKIYOU COUNTY GETS NEW PACIFIC HIGHWAY

At a meeting of the California state highway commission last week the commission decided on the route to follow from Redding into Siskiyou, and the western route up the Sacramento river was selected. The McCloud route which was much favored by the San Francisco millionaires who have summer homes along the McCloud river was abandoned.

This is a great victory for Siskiyou county. The \$18,000,000 state highway will now come up the Sacramento river canyon from Redding to Dunsuir, thence through Sisson, Gazelle, Yreka, Coles, over the Siskiyou mountains to Oregon. Yreka will assuredly be on the map when the county roads through western Siskiyou connect with the highway from San Francisco to Eureka, making a loop through the northern part of the state.
