MEN HANGED IN MEXICO WERE NOT AMERICANS

DOUGLAS, Ariz., Aug. 1.—John Hertling and Guido Herbert, the two men hanged at Monte Vista Sonora, about a week ago, judging by the condition of their bodies, were natives of Germany and subjects of that country, although Hertling had taken out his first citizenship papers in this country. Both men were well known here. The deaths will be reported to the German ambassador at Washington. No news of the identity of the perpetrators has been received here but the incident has been taken as a warning of danger to all foreigners in isolated and unprotected localities in Mexico.

100 PER CENT PROFIT FOR SUGAR TRUST

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 2.—The ownership of half the common stock of the Western Sugar Refining company, Spreckels' concern of San Francisco, has netted the Havemeyer interests in the American Sugar Refining company \$13,950,000 in the past 21 years. For all but two years of that time these payments were made on an investment that represented only \$500,000. This was developed today during the hearing of the government's suit to dissolve the American Sugar Refining company under the Sherman law.

KID M'COY REFUSED BAIL FOR GEM THEFT

LONDON, Aug. 2.—Attempts to secure the release on bail of Norman Selby, better known as "Kid McCoy," the American pugilist charged with implication in an \$80,000 jewel robbery at Ostend, failed here today. The magistrate presiding in Bow street court ordered Selby remanded until next Thursday, when extradition papers are expected from Belgium.

PASSENGERS ARE SAVED FROM BURNING SHIP

EUREKA, Cal., Aug. 2.—Aflame from bedplates to cabin, dripping with oil and severed from the world by the failure of her wireless the steamer F. A. Kilburn was saved from destruction last night by the heroic efforts of her crew.

Two girls narrowly escaped suffocation.

The oiler fell and broke his leg. Chief Engineer E. G. Clough and Sidney Aston, steward, who rescued the two girls fell heavily on the oil drenched decks and were badly bruised.

The Kilburn which left here yesterday returned under her own power this afternoon. She caught fire off Point Arena at 10 o'clock last night. Fire broke out in the engine room as oil was being moved from one fuel tank to another. The flames sucked up through the ventilating shaft to the state rooms as through a chimney. Stiffing, greasy black smoke filled the corridors. To add to the confusion the oil tanks were emptied and oil drenched the decks making them like greased slides, on which passengers and crew floundered about, slipping and falling at every lift and dip. After two hours and a half of fighting, the flames were placed under control and finally extinguished this morning.

O'BRIEN DEFEATS REES IN TEN ROUND BOUT

SAN FRANCISCO.—After ten rounds of fast and terrific milling Danny O'Brien, the clever Portland lightweight was given a close decision over Louis Rees the Los Angeles boxer.

Both men started to mix matters at the tap of the gong, O'Brien stopping the rushes of his opponent Rees with well directed straight lefts and right crosses. The first seven rounds were about even up with O'Brien having a good shade the last three.

It was one of the fastest ten round bouts seen around the bay cities in many a day and the Portland boy showed crafty ring generalship throughout.

UNCLE SAM IS SAVED FROM BANKRUPTCY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—Temporary relief from bankruptcy in which the government found itself was relieved today by congress, through the passage of an emergency appropriation resolution which was sent to the president late today. It carries forward appropriations which they existed in June and July for another "half month" to August 15. By then it is expected the annual appropriation will be passed.

"WHITEY" LEWIS IS NABBED BY POLICE

NEW YORK, Aug. 2.—"Whitey" Lewis, one of the four men wanted by the police as one of the actual murderers of Gambler Rosenthal, was arrested in the Catskill mountains this afternoon and tonight is being taken to Kingston, N. Y., to be lodged in the county jail. He will be brought to New York tomorrow. It is reported at headquarters to-

night that "Lefty" Louis and "Gip the Blood," two other alleged murderers, have been tracked to the same vicinity and their arrest will come soon.

With the arrest of Lewis, the police now have in custody two of the four alleged assassins, the other being Dago Frank who is now in the Tombs, a fellow prisoner of Lieutenant Becker charged with inciting the gunmen to kill Rosenthal.
