NOTED MINING MAN TO RUN NORLING MINE

James H. Henley, former manager of the Granite Mountain and Drum Lumond mines in Montana has been secured to manage the Medford Mining & Milling Company's mine near Jacksonville, the "Norling Mine." The contract with Mr. Henley was made Friday afternoon. He is one of the most prominent and successful mining men in the country having had charge of a number of very large producers in various mining camps.

The Granite Mountain Mine, which he managed for many years, was the largest silver mine in the world, producing over \$12,000,000 in dividends. It is located at Granite, Mont.

The securing of the services of a mining man with the experience and ability of Mr. Henley means much for the successful operation of a property which is considered one of the most valuable prospects in this vicinity. Several cars of high grade ore is at present blocked out there, and a considerable quantity of pay ore is at present blocked out there. SHOOTS LANDLADY AND TERRORIZES TOWN

DENVER, Colo., Aug. 3.—Fighting desperately with a sheriff's posse until dropped by a bullet George Ballew, owner of a stage line, who last night entered the dining room of the South Platte Hotel, at South Platte, Colo., 20 miles south of here, and shot and seriously wounded Mrs. Charles Wallbrack owner of the hotel and wounded James McWhorren, a Kansas City tourist, was captured in the mountains near there shortly before noon today and brought here. Ballew is seriously wounded.

After shooting Mrs. Wallbrack and McWhorren, Ballew set fire to the hotel and then terrorized the town for two hours by firing up and down the streets. Then he went to the telegraph office and ordered the operator not to send out any news of the affair under penalty of death. The operator obeyed the command until this morning when he sent out an alarm. Ballew is believed to be insane.
