This was the remedy suggested today by Dr. R. E. Doolittle, Dr. Wiley's successor as Uncle Sam's chief of the pure food board. "Beans," said Dr. Doolittle, "are the best substitute for beef. One should not eat meat, anyway, more than once a day, depending of course, upon the physical condition and employment of the person. Hard workers need more meat than those in sedentary work. It seems to me the harder a man works and the lower his wages, the more meat he needs. Meat is protein. Protein is strength. Mind you, I am not recommending a vegetarian diet as the best and only diet, but substitutes for meat."

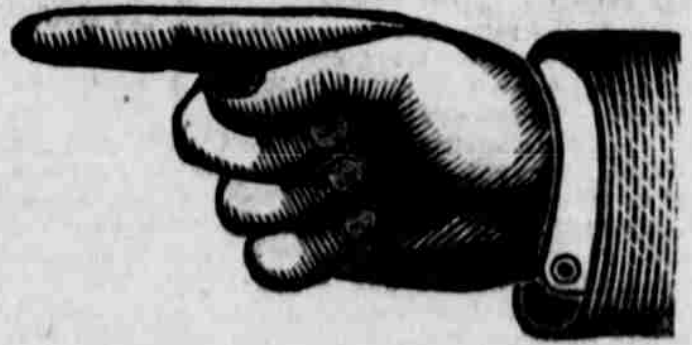
CHINESE REPUBLIC TO HOLD GENERAL ELECTION
PEKIN, Aug. 6.—Announcement was made here today that Yuan Shi Kai is planning for a national election in November in which the polls, however, will be located only in the principal cities. This will not give everyone a chance to vote but the measure is excused on the ground that it would take an interminable time otherwise to get at the results of the balloting. The people will elect a parliament which will in turn elect a president of the republic.
