WASHINGTON, Aug. 8.—Pacific Coast senators faced well here today when the assignments in the senate were rearranged to fill recent vacancies. An important assignment was that of Senator La Follette to membership on the committee on inter-state and foreign commerce. Senator Poindexter of Washington was appointed chairman of the committee on the Pacific Islands; Senator Jones of Washington, chairman of the committee on irrigation, and Senator Works of California chairman of the committee on fisheries. Senator Oliver of Pennsylvania was made junior member of the committee on appropriations. The selection of Senator La Follette on the inter-state commerce committee is regarded as open recognition of his ability in matters dealing with railroad legislation.

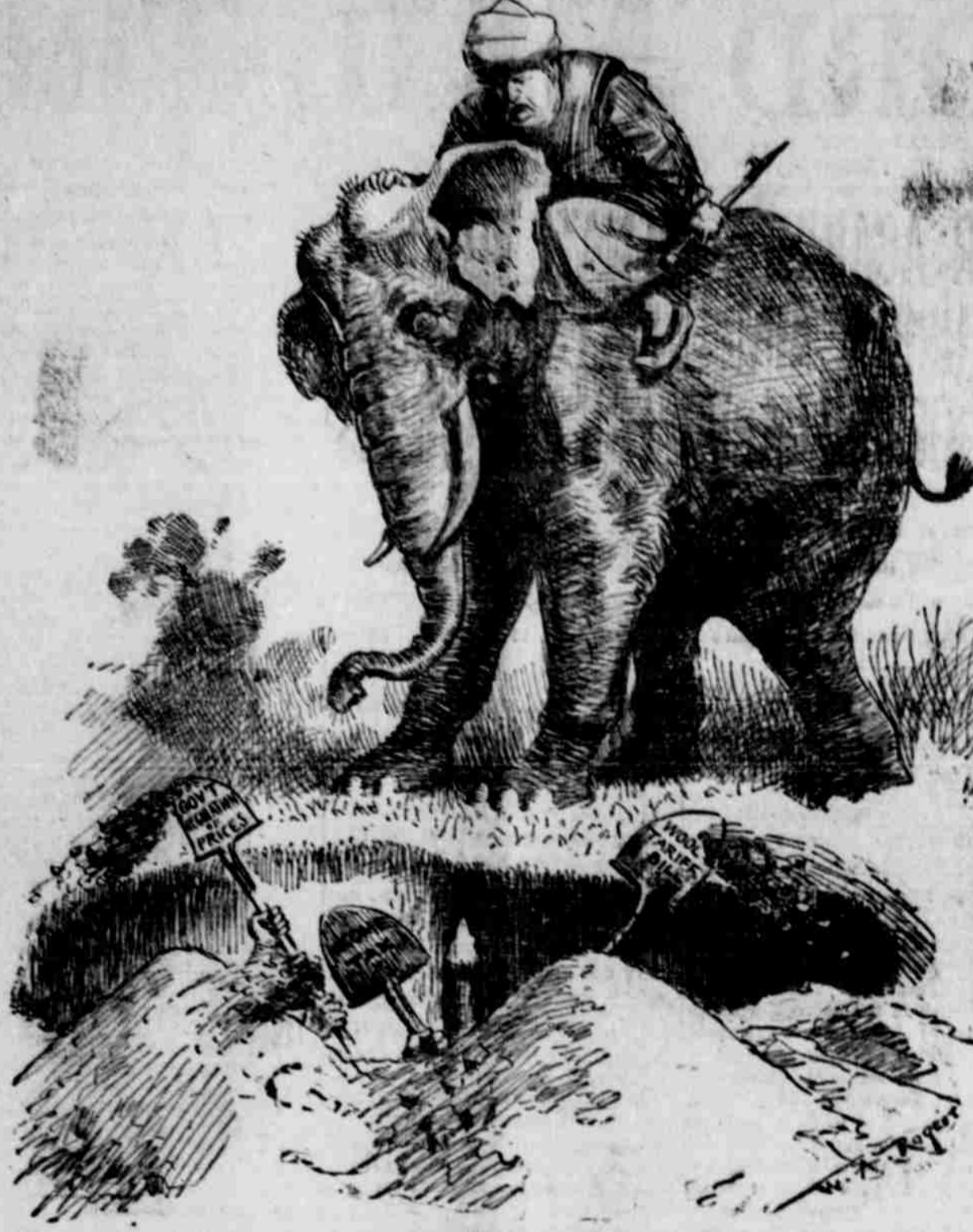
MEDFORD TO MEET ROSEBURG ON DIAMOND IN TWO GAMES

BRYAN SCORES TAFT'S ACCEPTANCE

LINCOLN, Neb., Aug. 8.—Denouncing President Taft's speech of acceptance of the republican nomination, William J. Bryan says today in his publication, The Commoner: "He accepts Taft's guarantee of regularity without even a smile, and even adds his endorsement of the proceedings which resulted in his nomination. "What an outstanding indifference to the intelligence of the public! He and Root know that he is not the choice of the majority of republican voters; they know the Taft administration is repudiated by those who elected him; they know that the hold-over national committee deliberately and contemptuously disregarded the voters of the party and changed the character of the convention by the seating of the Taft delegates."

STUBBS DEFEATS CURTIS FOR SENATE

TOPEKA, Kan., Aug. 8.—Latest returns received today from Tuesday's primary election indicate that Governor W. R. Stubbs has defeated Charles Curtis, incumbent, for the United States senatorship. Stubbs claimed this morning to have carried eighty-five of the one hundred and sixty-five counties in the state and returns later increase this lead. Returns from the western counties are coming in slowly. If Stubbs finally is shown to have been elected, the progressives will have made a clean sweep of the state. The latest returns received here increase the majorities of the Roosevelt presidential electors.

SUBSTANTIAL ADVANCES ON NEW YORK MARKET

NEW YORK, Aug. 8.—Today's opening stock market developed substantial advances. Lehigh Valley was up a point and Reading, Atchafson, Great Northern and United States Steel showed strength. American Tobacco with a loss of 1 1/2, was the only noteworthy exception to the upward trend. Harriman and Hill stocks were in fair demand and were firm. National Biscuit fell 1 1/2 later in the day. BURNS TO FIGHT WITH BILL RICKARD

SASKATOON, Sask., Aug. 8.—A fifteen round bout to decide the heavyweight championship of Canada will be fought between Tommy Burns of Calgary and Bill Rickard of Vancouver at the Saskatoon Athletic Club tonight. Burns regards the bout as something of a tryout, since he has not been in the ring for many months, and is endeavoring to get a match with Jack Johnson. Rickard is said to be a good man and able to hold his own with the best of the hopes. Burns is expected to scale about 180 pounds and Rickard 190. Both men are in splendid condition. Regarding a bout with Jack Johnson, Burns said today: "I am ready and willing to fight Johnson any old time and any old place but I want certain conditions made. In good condition I weigh about 190 pounds, while Johnson would be at least 35 pounds heavier. That's a lot of weight to give away and I don't intend to let Johnson beat me as he did in Australia. I will fight Johnson ten rounds clean break, no hitting in the clinches, and he can cut the money any way he pleases. I can beat him at those terms and I know it."
