

DOUGLAS JANNEY HANGS HIMSELF TO RAFTER OF BARN

Douglas Janney, aged 27, committed suicide Thursday morning by hanging himself from the rafter of a barn on the Janney ranch west of Central Point. The body was not found for sometime afterward. A verdict of suicide was rendered by the coroner's jury. The young man is said to have been despondent for some time induced by ill health. He was alone at the ranch at the time of the suicide. The tragedy comes as a great shock to the members of the young man's family.

Janney made his home at the ranch with his mother who is at present visiting in the east. She has been notified and will reach Medford in time for the funeral which will be held Saturday morning from the residence of Paul Janney, a brother, on the Jacksonville road.

So far as can be determined no word was left by the young man and relatives are at a loss for the motive. The Janney family formerly resided at Minneapolis moving to this city several years ago.

Aside from his mother Douglas Janney leaves two brothers and a sister. The brothers are Paul Janney, deputy county assessor, Edward Janney, and a sister, Mrs. Henry Ramsey of Washington, D. C., who is at present visiting in this city.

CALIFORNIANS PLAN OVATION FOR JOHNSON

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Aug. 9.—California's home-coming demonstration for Governor Johnson in recognition of his nomination for the vice presidency on the progressive ticket will be given in Dreamland Rink, San Francisco, Monday night.

Beside the governor the speakers will include Charles S. Wheeler, who seconded his nomination in Chicago; Chester H. Rowell, who was a member of the resolutions committee, and former Governor George C. Pardee. Johnson will declare the policies of the new party for the national campaign, and will discuss the position of the party in California.

HIGHWAYMAN AT POINT OF DEATH SINGS OLD SONG

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah, Aug. 9.—Humming "Silver Threads Among the Gold," during his intermittent moments of consciousness, an unidentified highwayman lies in the Midvale jail today, mortally wounded, and Night Marshal Frank McCollough of Midvale is dead as the result of an attempted hold-up of the Vienna saloon in that town.

Two desperadoes, in making a sensational attempt to rob the saloon were frustrated by Marshal McCollough, whose revolver sent four bullets into the body of one man. The other bandit escaped. McCollough's gun was spitting fire as he died.

FORGER IS CAPTURED AFTER FIVE LONG YEARS

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 8.—A five years search by officers from Butte, Mont., resulted in the locating of Rem Demeyer, 39, who is wanted in Butte for forgery. Demeyer eloped with another man's wife. Soon after he was wanted on a charge of forgery. When finally traced to Seattle the woman in the case came forward and told the officers all about Demeyer. She declared he not only forged her husband's name when they ran away from Butte but that he stole \$1,100. Demeyer fought extradition and papers had to be obtained from Butte. Under Sheriff Murray is on his way to Butte with the prisoner.

BRITISH COLUMBIA TO BOYCOTT FAIR

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 9.—The party of fifty enthusiasts from San Francisco, who, according to recent despatches from the California city, are due to arrive in Vancouver on August 18 to advertise the Panama Pacific exposition and stimulate interest in the coming event, may not receive the undivided support for California's pet fair that the people of this city have hitherto accorded the project.

"A special meeting of the board of trade will be called to discuss the question whether the people of this city and the province should not withdraw from any active or official participation in the forthcoming Panama-Pacific exposition to be held in San Francisco in 1915. I see that the British government is considering a similar course, and I am convinced that it is the only dignified thing to do in view of the action of the majority of the United States senate in repudiating its treaty obligations."

The above statement was made by Mr. A. B. Erskine, president of the Vancouver board of trade, when shown the despatch from London to the effect that Great Britain, following Wednesday's vote in the American senate, declaring for discrimination in favor of American vessels on the new waterway.

WIFE OF MILLIONAIRE DROPS FROM SIGHT

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 9.—Diligent search here today failed to throw any light on the whereabouts of Mrs. H. C. Akeley, young widow of an aged Minneapolis millionaire lumberman, who was reported to have passed through Portland on the way to Long Beach, Cal., where she married Akeley a few months ago and where her motherlives. No woman of her name has registered at any of the principal hotels nor had any woman answering her description registered under another name so far as could be ascertained.

CHINESE GIRL IS RESCUED FROM AWFUL FATE

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 9.—After being confined in a small box-like structure in an alley of Chinatown here, Lee Sing, a pretty Chinese girl, of 16, is free today and the police are searching for a wealthy slave dealer, who is alleged to have held the girl prisoner.

Lee Sing was rescued by the police just her as captors were about to spirit her away to Stockton. Miss Donaldina Caeron, of the Chinese mission, having been told of the girl's predicament, informed the police.
