FROM YREKA TO EUREKA BY ROAD

COLVIG CALLS LIE WITH \$500 OFFER

NAB MAN WANTED AT SACRAMENTO

YREKA, Cal., Aug. 10.—The county supervisors held a special session to meet a couple of Humboldt county officials and discuss with them the building of a county road from Orleans Bar to Somes Bar on the part of Humboldt county, Siskiyous to build from Somes Bar up the Klamath river or Salmon river or both, to connect with the state highway which is to be constructed through the county from Dunsmuir to Coles, in a north and south direction.

County Surveyor G. W. Connors and Supervisor R. Anderson of Humboldt county were present, having made the trip on horseback from Eureka by way of Orleans. They inspected the proposed route closely and were greatly impressed with its feasibility and scenic beauty. The proposed road will form a connecting link between the state highway up the coast to Eureka and the central state highway which is to be built up the Sacramento river through Siskiyou county to the Oregon state line. It would be used every year by thousands of tourists in going from one branch of the state highway to the other.

At the joint meeting in Yreka last Saturday the matter was thoroughly discussed by the visiting officials and the Siskiyou supervisors, including Deputy County Surveyor E. W. Nolan, County Highway Engineer Noel E. Graves, Highway Commissioner A. A. Milliken of Fort Jones and Postmaster Chas. B. Bryant of Sawyers Bar. Both the Klamath and Salmon routes were considered feasible, and one or both will be constructed next year.

Humboldt county has already built the road from Eureka to Orleans, and will extend it this year to the Siskiyou line, providing our supervisors agree to continue the extension eastwardly to connect with the state highway. This will be done, and there is no doubt of the completion of the loop at an early date.

A steel cable suspension bridge has been built across the Klamath river for the road to Orleans. This bridge is fourteen feet wide and cost \$10,000, Humboldt county standing \$7,000 of the expense, the forest service \$2,000 and the citizens of Orleans \$1,000.

Siskiyou county now has a force of surveyors at work and both the Salmon and Klamath routes will be surveyed.
