OHIO DELEGATION SPLITS ON GOVERNOR NOMINATION

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Aug. 12.—After the nomination for governor of General B. B. Brown, eight members of that body led by State Chairman Walter L. Brown and Secretary Foster resigned. The meeting was called to fill a vacancy caused by the refusal of Judge Dillon to make the race. Roosevelt members centered their strength on United States District Attorney Dennon. The vote was Brown eleven, Dennon eight; two Roosevelt members absent. Before the meeting Taft leaders asked all candidates for minor offices to approve E. M. Fullington. The majority refused. Taft leaders then decided to support Brown. After the split Walter Brown and other supporters of Roosevelt said they expected a complete progressive state ticket to be placed in the field at once.

"WIN OR LOSE, IT'S A FIGHT WORTH MAKING"—ROOSEVELT OYSTER BAY, Aug. 12.—"Win or lose, it's a fight worth making," Col. Roosevelt said today. "Whatever the outcome of the campaign it is my opinion that a new era in American political history will be dated from the progressive convention. For more than forty years, he said sporadic reform movements had come into existence, citing Bryan's campaign of 1896 and the populist movement as examples. Most of them, he declared, had contained something good but were coupled with quack remedies worse than the disease supposed to cure. The good points of all of them he declared had been assembled in the progressive party's policies and for the first time there were given to the country these ideas without the accompaniment of what he termed preposterous declarations which make it impossible for sane men to follow them.

ALASKA VOLCANO IS STILL EMITTING DENSE SMOKE

SEWARD, Alaska, Aug. 12.—The steamship Dora here on her monthly trip from westward reports Mount Katmai which was in violent eruption in June is now emitting great volumes of dense smoke. The fishing season at Bristol Bay has closed and all canneries report capacity packs.
