## MRS. CHAMP CLARK OPPOSES DEATH PENALTY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12.—A plea for the abolishment of the death penalty was voiced here today by Mrs. Champ Clark, wife of the

speaker of the house of representatives, after he had read the newspaper accounts of he wholesale executions at Ossining, N. Y., this morning.

"The seven executions in New York today," she said, "is a striking ex-

ample of the social inefficiency of the death penalty. I would not like to be responsible for taking what I could not give—a human life. If these victims could have been put at some public work how much better it would be for society."

## MANIAC TRIES TO INCINERATE HIMSELF

CHICAGO, Aug. 12.—Grinning insanely as the flames he had started in his cell licked his face, body and hands, Jacob Guthrie, the man who stole \$350,000 worth of merchandise "just for the fun of stealing," was saved from death here by six turnkeys after a terrific fight. Guthrie attracted the attention of other prisoners by shouts of laughter after he had set fire to his clothing. When the turnkeys attempted to extinguish the flames he fought with the strength of a maniac.

"Go away, you idiots," he shouted. "It's fun to die. Go away and let me alone."

Guthrie was seriously burned before the clothing was torn from his body.

Scientists became interested in Guthrie's case when it developed that he stole \$350,000 of merchandise without attempting to dispose of it, storing the plunder in a warehouse.

BERLIN, Aug. 12.—Announcement was made here today that the Kaiser has chosen Prince Henry of Prussia as his representative to attend the funeral of the late Emperor Meiji of Japan, which is to be held next month.

## PRICES KEEP UP LIVESTOCK MARKET

PORTLAND, Aug. 12.—Receipts for the week have been, cattle, 2052; calves, 34; hogs, 1041; sheep, 4265; horses, 48.

While cattle receipts show an increase over the previous week, the requirements of the trade were not met and prices remained at the same steady high plane that has characterized the business of the entire summer. Cows \$5.40 to \$5.90; steers, \$6.25 to \$7.00.

Scarcity of calf receipts signify not only that the country has been closely drained but also that farmers are beginning to realize the wisdom of holding something for future cattle supplies.

The hog market reached \$9.00 for the week and there was an active strong tone throughout.

The sheep and lamb market was steady.
