SPLENDID MAP OF MOUNTAIN ROADS IN FOREST ISSUED

The local office of the Crater National forest has just received 9000 maps of the forest for free distribution. These maps show all roads, trails, ranger stations, hotels, stage line, railroads, telephone lines and cabins inside the forest as well as lake, mountains, and places of interest. The principal roads, towns and cities in Jackson county are shown making the maps, invaluable to hunters, campers, or travelers in the forest or county. The map was prepared under the direction of Supervisor Erickson. On the back of the folder is much information regarding game laws, board of health laws which apply to mountain streams and data on the control of fires. The maps are very valuable.

The Crater National Forest contains practically all that is left unappropriated of the former hunting grounds of the Indians in this region. It lies in two blocks. The more northerly and larger block extends on the northwest to the crest of the Umpqua Mountains and on the northeast to the boundary of the Crater Lake National Park. Lake-of-the-Woods, Fish Lake, and Four Mile Lake are in the southern part of this block, which contains the southern end of the Cascade Mountains; the basin of Rogue River and its tributaries lies between the Umpqua Mountains and the Cascade Plateau, and drains them both. The trails which have been constructed by the Forest Service make available to tourists and pleasure seekers the trout streams, mountain lakes, hunting grounds, mineral springs, and other recreation features, while a mountain road to Crater Lake runs through the forest.

The southern block of the Crater National Forest covers the northern end of the Siskiyou Mountains, and extends into California to the crest of the divide.

SINKING SHIP OF G. O. P. DESERTED BY CANDIDATES

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 14.—Following the final decision of progressive at a meeting held here to put out a complete progressive state ticket from Governor down to wreck master, progressive candidates who had filed in the republican primaries are rapidly withdrawing their candidacy today.

"Bob" Hodge, of Seattle, and John C. Lawrence of Spokane, candidates for Governor, were both out of the city at the time the full ticket was agreed upon, but immediately announced their withdrawal from the old party. Candidates for minor offices are wiring, telephoning, writing and presenting personally their withdrawals to the state auditor and the various county auditors.

As it appears now, the republican ticket will be stripped bare of its candidates in many offices, and standpatters alone will be left in the others. The time for filings has passed in the republican primaries and no new candidates can be put in.

The decision to put out a full ticket followed within a few hours after the local delegates to the recent bull moose convention arrived yesterday. The nominations of the third party candidates, it was decided, are to be made in accordance with state-wide preferential primaries.

The law of this state requires new parties to nominate by convention. The primaries, however, will be considered morally binding upon the delegates to such convention. The formal call, naming the day for the primary and the place for the convention, will be issued within twenty-four hours probably by the Roosevelt delegates to both Chicago conventions, the central committee of the tentatively organized third party, the Roosevelt campaign committee selected at the Aberdeen state convention recently, the officers of the progressive leagues, in this state, and Lorenzo Dow, national committeeman for this state for the new progressive party.

HEROIC RESCUE BY YOUNG GIRL CANOIST

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 14.—Details of the brave rescue by Miss Stella Burger of Portland of her fiancée's sister, Miss Rose Weiser, from drowning in the Willamette river became known here today. With David Weiser, to whom Miss Burger was engaged, the two girls were coming down the Willamette river from Eugene to Portland in a canoe. The canoe capsized in Deer Creek Rapids near Albany. Weiser tried to rescue his sister but seemed unable to do so though a good swimmer. Miss Burger swam to Miss Weiser's aid and after a terribly hard struggle succeeded in reaching shore with her a mile down stream from where the canoe capsized. Then she returned to look for Weiser but he had been drowned. His body is not recovered.

SMALL FIRES IN CRATER FOREST

A small forest fire is raging at the head of Star Gulch in the Applegate section, according to reports received today by the local forestry officials. It is believed that it will be under control in the near future as several men are at work.

A fire broke out on Elliot creek Monday but was under control before any great amount of damage was done.

As the forest is very dry at present with high winds each afternoon the danger from fire is very great and precautions have been redoubled.

ROOSEVELT TO STUMP THIRTY-SIX STATES

OYSTER BAY, N. Y., Aug. 14.—Plans for the progressive campaign were discussed here today at a conference between Colonel Roosevelt, Senator Dixon and George W. Perkins.

Roosevelt announced that he expects to stump in thirty-six states, but the details of the tour have not yet been completed. The colonel begins his longest western trip with a speech at St. Paul on Labor Day.
