H. D. Wagon, Single Taxer and Democratic candidate for assessor in Multnomah County, spent Wednesday in Medford in the interest of the Single Tax movement. He said: "The graduated tax and exemption amendment is going to carry in this state by a large majority, from the fact that it will reduce taxes on the farmer and home owner about sixty per cent."
