

FARMERS SIGN FOR ELECTRIC SERVICE

The farmers and fruit growers of the entire valley are becoming alive to the importance of electric power in its application to the farm, especially as it is used by the irrigator in raising water to his land.

Monday night the farmers of the vicinity of Applegate met with representatives of the Oregon-California Power Co. Tuesday a meeting was held at Provoit, and Wednesday Williams was the scene of a meeting. Thursday the citizens of Murphy discussed the electric question.

The power company proposes that if enough encouragement is given by the people of the Applegate and Williams counties, the line will be extended, and a service of current for power and lighting given. The people along the route of the proposed line are enthusiastic, and many are already signing up contracts, a number having agreed to take current for large motors for running pumping plants, so that there is little doubt about the building of the line.

COUNTRY CLUB TO OPEN AUGUST 24

The Medford Country club will be opened Saturday, August 24, and arrangements have been completed for a golf tournament, indoor baseball game, trap shooting, supper and dance. There will also be a tennis tournament and probably a putting contest for the ladies.

The club is now practically completed and has been a revelation to all who have visited it. The old house on the place has been remodelled, a large porch constructed on two sides and accommodations for a steward and stewardess made. Meals will be served and it is predicted that the club will be one of the most popular institutions in the valley.

The original date for opening August 15, was postponed because of the delay in securing electric light. This has now been arranged for and the nine hole course is in excellent condition. The tennis courts are said to be the finest in southern Oregon. Hal Bingham and H. Chandler Egan have been largely responsible for the splendid condition of the grounds both men having given generously of their time and help.

REDMEN PLAN NEW WIGWAM

The local tribe of Redmen are planning to erect a wigwam on a lot owned by them on Apple street between Fourth and Fifth and are now raising a fund for that purpose. They have every prospect of success.

The former president will speak at Revere Beach, Mass., tomorrow, and probably will attack Governor Wilson, the democratic nominee, in his address there.

LOCAL RIFLE TEAM MAKES HIGH SCORE

Although competing for the first time at a rifle range, the Medford rifle team of the 7th company of Coast Artillery, convinced that they were in the running and succeeded in bringing home two medals while they defeated the seasoned Ashland company team by 14 points.

The team competed against 110 riflemen, many of whom had made high averages in other years. Notwithstanding this fact the 7th company boys led the field in the 600 and 1000 yard ranges. The skirmish run proved to be the cause of the boys downfall from lack of experience. This target is made by shooting ten times lying flat on the ground at intervals of every hundred yards.

Sergeant Merrick had charge of the team which comprised Corporal Marshall and Privates Hill, Rose and Howell. The efficiency that the team attained and upon which they were complimented by Col. Hammond is due to his training.

Corporal Marshall made high average, scoring above 80. The three others missed this mark by but one or two points.
