GOVERNOR PROBES ARMY MEETING

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 20.—Colonel John M. Poorman, commander of the Third Infantry, Oregon National Guard, was the principal witness today in the inquiry before Governor West into the alleged mutiny of the Second Battalion of the Third Regiment during the recent army maneuvers near Gate City, Washington.

Colonel Poorman testified regarding conditions at the time when the order was issued by General Maus, U. S. A., in command at the maneuvers for the Second Battalion to march from Oakville to Gate and in connection with which the battalion is alleged to have mutinied. The officer stated he protested when the order was made on account of the poor condition of his men but afterwards obeyed and the march was made.

SHIELDS ADDRESSES FAIR SIZED CROWD

Before a fair-sized audience Charles H. Shields of Seattle spoke last evening at the Opera House on Single Tax and roundly scored the measure to be voted upon in November. The speaker was introduced by W. H. Gore.

Mr. Shields is a forcible speaker and has his arguments against Single Tax lined up well. He answered a large number of questions asked him by a supporter of Henry George.

ROOSEVELT TO SPEAK AT SACRAMENTO SEPT 14

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Aug. 20.—Edgar M. Sheehan, president of the Sacramento Roosevelt club, has been notified that Colonel Roosevelt probably will speak here about Sept. 14. Other places at which the Bull Moose leader is scheduled to speak are San Francisco, Oakland, Santa Barbara and Los Angeles.

A demonstration of welcome will be accorded Roosevelt when he arrives here, his first stop in the state.

NEW JUDGE TO TRY DARROW

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 20.—Preferring not to hear argument on the motion to dismiss the second indictment against Clarence S. Darrow, charging bribery of Robert F. Bain, Judge George H. Hutton, who presided over the trial of Darrow which ended last Saturday announced today, when the case was called that he would assign the case to Presiding Judge Willis.

Judge Willis will hear arguments on the defense's motion to dismiss the indictment tomorrow morning.

Preparing to combat the motion to dismiss, the district attorney's office claims that Darrow waived his right to trial within the sixty day limit, as provided in the statutes, at the opening of the first trial. Upon the fact that Darrow has not been brought to trial within the sixty day limit the defense is basing its motion to dismiss.

Supporting the district attorney's contention, Deputy District Attorney Arthur Keech today filed an affidavit in which he declares that Darrow waived his right to trial within the sixty day limit in stipulations entered into May 15.

When questioned concerning the affidavit, Darrow declared that he knew nothing of any stipulation being entered into.
