LEMANS, France, Aug. 22.—Funds to erect a monument to the late Wilbur Wright of Dayton, Ohio, on the Plains of Anouvers, where the American aviator made his first flight in France, were set aside today by the city council of Lemans.

14,000 STREET CAR MEN PLAN STRIKE

CHICAGO, Aug. 22.—More than 14,000 street and elevated railway employees are expected to walk out here within the next week unless there is an immediate change in the attitude of the railway company officials, according to a statement issued today by union leaders.

One of the company officials declared that the North and West side companies were willing to compromise, but that President Busby of the South Side Railways refused to deal with the men. The employees accuse Busby of fostering a strike, asserting that he has already imported 800 strikebreakers. Busby denies this charge, saying that in the event of a strike all cars will be left in the barns and no attempt made to operate them for ninety days.

ROOSEVELT READY FOR SENATE PROBE

WILKESBARRE, Pa., Aug. 22.—Indications that he stands ready to answer any statements that Senator Penrose may make regarding the contributions to his presidential campaign in 1904 was given today by Colonel Theodore Roosevelt. The former president is here to attend the 25th anniversary of the ordination of Father J. J. Curran. If necessary, it is believed, Colonel Roosevelt will testify before the senate campaign contributions committee.

In his speech here this afternoon before 15,000 people Colonel Roosevelt discussed moral issues, but made no references to the political situation.

PROHIBIT DANCING TO GIVE HENS THEIR SLEEP

PARIS, Aug. 22.—The following humanitarian decree has been promulgated by the mayor of one of the smaller communes in the Pyrenees: Whereas, the young people of the commune are wont to meet and dance every Sunday after mass, and the noise they make frightens the cocks, hens and other animals of the village; and Whereas, the result is prejudicial to agriculture, we hereby prohibit dancing within the bounds of the commune during the hours in which the domestic animals take their repose.

MEXICAN REBELS SEIZE A GUNBOAT

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 22.—It is reported today that rebels in the state of Sonora have burned and looted the town of Ladura. The steamer Benito Juarez and the gunboat General Guerrero, it is stated, have been seized by the rebels. No mention of loss of life is made in the reports received here.
