(Continued from page 1.) president and also treasurer of the National Providence Woosted Mills of Rhode Island, and holds directorships in the Merchants National Bank and the Pierce Manufacturing Company of New Bedford, Mass., besides being president of the American Woolen Company, commonly known as the trust.

Wood's salary exceeds that of the President of the United States, being in excess of \$100,000 a year. He is a multi-millionaire, and from his office in Boston is said to have directed the fight the mill operators waged against the Lawrence Textile operations.

Rise is Meteoric Wood's rise in the commercial world has been meteoric. He is the son of a Portuguese immigrant and started work in the mills for 75 cents a day. A willing worker, bright and ambitious, he rose by steady stages until today he is the head of the so-called woolen trust, one of the most powerful corporations in the country.

A third man, said to have been indicted with Wood, is reported to be the president of another big New England mill.
