

### FORMER STUDENTS OF UNIVERSITY TO HOLD REUNION

There will be a reunion of the former students of the University of Oregon in a banquet at the Holland Hotel, at six o'clock next Tuesday evening. Fifty or sixty of the prominent citizens of Southern Oregon who received their training at the state university will be in attendance. President P. L. Campbell and Dr. George Rebec of the faculty of the University will be present and will speak upon the plans and work of the college. Special emphasis will be made in their talks, concerning the extension feature of the University work.

The University, although crippled by the lack of sufficient financial support is making rapid progress in the development of its extension departments. Through its correspondence school, it is placing at the disposal of the people in their homes free instruction from the experts at the University. There are about four hundred students registered in the correspondence department at present. In the session of summer school work which closed but recently, one hundred sixty students, composed of principals and teachers in the high schools and small colleges of the state, school supervisors, and superintendents were enrolled. Prominent educators from the eastern institutions took part in the lectures and courses composing the curricula of the different departments.

Under Professor Frederick G. Young, the Department of Economics has become a laboratory for the legislators and commissions to which are intrusted the important legislation of the state. The seniors are all required to gather elaborate statistics concerning some vital public problem and put them in the form of a thesis. Many of the graduates from this department have been engaged as experts by the various commissions of the state government.

Another phase of extension work has been the annual gathering at the University on Commonwealth Day of the thinkers of the state to discuss different public issues. Last February four or five of the prominent citizens of Medford took part in the discussions at the Common Wealth Day exercises.

Men of all political faiths are invited to this annual conference and some ferocious melees are often staged. The aim is to bring out the merits of the different sides of the issues and get at the fundamental truths. Good Roads Legislation, Employer's Liability Laws, and Forest Fire protection were some of the subjects discussed at the last meeting.

A field which promises to develop an important phase of the extension work under Dr. George Rebec is that of holding meetings in the different parts of the state to discuss historical, social, and educational questions. In the past the professors of University have had many calls upon them from the chautauquas and other conventions, but there has been no organized system of bringing the professors into touch with the people.

The work of Dr. Rebec will consist of connecting the University more vitally with the life of the people of the state in their homes.

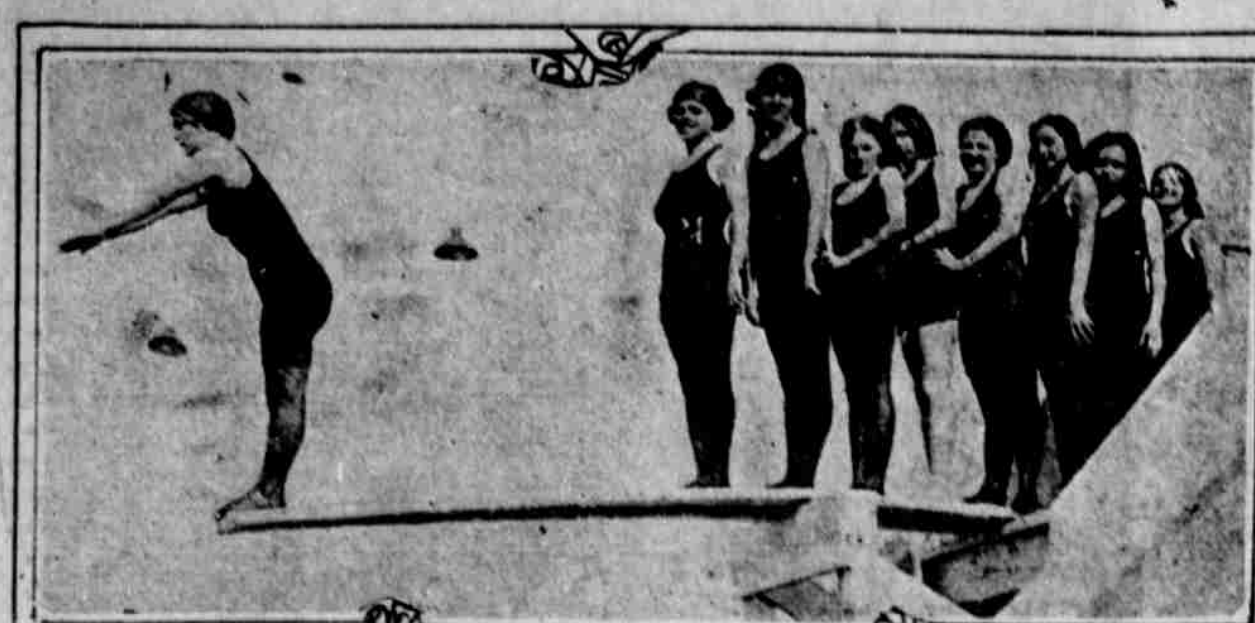

### COWLES REQUESTS WEST TO REMOVE ATTORNEL MULKEY

F. W. Cowles of the Westway orchards who has indulged in a wordy war with R. F. Mulkey regarding fire protection in Jackson county during the past few days, on Thursday evening telegraphed Governor West asking that District Attorney Mulkey be removed as that an attorney be appointed who "will enforce the law." Mr. Cowles' action followed his appearance before the grand jury Thursday in this connection. What action the governor will take is not yet known.

The grand jury Thursday declined to take any action in the matter. When the body convened in March the difference hotel keepers in the county were ordered to put in adequate fire escapes, and according to witnesses before the grand jury Thursday, these orders have been observed. The Hotel Medford was ordered to put in an additional fire escape on the north side and were given until September 10 to do so. Manager Mohr of the Medford assures the officials that this will be done. It is this fire escape which Mr. Cowles insists upon.

Mr. Cowle Thursday exhibited a photograph of a victim of a hotel fire at Portland. The photo shows the man, badly burned lying on a slab at the morgue.

"Above this man's dead body I swear that the fire laws of Jackson county should be observed, and I mean to see that they are," states Mr. Cowles.
