NEW STREET CAR SERVICE RULES

CHICAGO, Ill., Sept. 2.—New rules announced to be put into effect tomorrow by the roads affiliated with the American Railway Car association are expected to remedy a grievance of long standing in the railroad world. Up to the present time all railroads have been in the habit of using foreign equipment to any part of the country, providing it was returned to the company within a reasonable length of time. Under this method the smaller lines have had the use of more cars than they actually owned, which the larger roads which owned the equipment have experienced a car shortage, their appeals for the return of their property often going unheeded. The new rules provide that all the foreign equipment must be returned to the owners from the point of destination and not used by the railroad in whose territory the equipment happens to be to haul freight to points farther away. Severe penalties are to be imposed on the companies violating the agreement.

NO BOATS TO UPPER POINTS ON COLUMBIA

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 2.—Because of lack of support, steamers of the Open River Transportation company, operating between Portland and points on the upper Columbia river will be withdrawn about October 1, according to an announcement today. One of the principal reasons for the establishment of the open-river transportation steamer line was to compel lower railroad rates from lines paralleling the Columbia river and in this it is credited with having been successful to a marked degree. The only steamers that will ply the upper Columbia river after the Open River Transportation company boats are withdrawn will be those operated by railroads.

BRING WHALE OIL TO CANADIAN POINTS

VANCOUVER, B. C., Sept. 2.—Bringing 2300 barrels of whale oil from the Naden and Rose Harbor whaling stations, the steamer Gray, Captain Shadforth, of the Canadian North Pacific Fisheries company, is in port today from the Queen Charlotte islands. According to reports the whalers are making good catches, having taken seventeen sulphur bottom whales, two humpbacks and two finbacks during the past ten days.

NEWPORT, Wales, Sept. 2.—Five hundred delegates, representing 2,000,000 unionists, met here today in the world's biggest union congress. The sessions will continue through-out the week.
