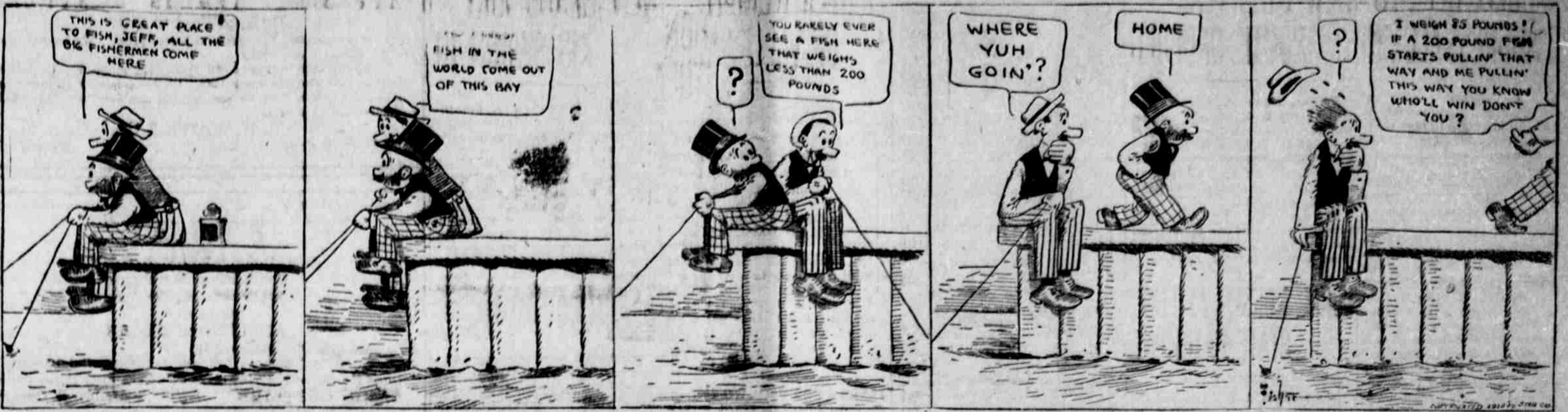


Little Jeff Refused to Tackle Anything at Catchweights

NEW YORKERS WANT JONATHANS

Scobel & Day issue the following dated New York, August 27: Seventy-seven cars Monday and sixty-four today (Tuesday) shows continued heavy arrivals. PEACE ESSENTIAL FOR LABOR'S FUTURE

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 3.—No solution of the labor problem can be had "until there are no idle poor and no more idle rich," according to Clarence S. Darrow, the Chicago attorney, recently acquitted in Los Angeles on a charge of jury bribing, who is here today. Darrow delivered the Labor Day oration at Shellmound Park. A crowd of 12,000 listened while Darrow discussed the labor question and broadly expressed his sarcasm at labor's attempt to improve its condition.

"Labor must turn its attention to the fundamental conditions," he said. "Strikes, lockouts, dynamite, the penitentiary and the scaffold never will solve the problem. You must get family."
